*Rollin Melton-2001*

You'll find 101 such stories in this collection of columns selected from hundreds more that Rollin Melton has written during the 14 years since 1987.

### **A Child Called "It"**

*Dave Pelzer, 1995*

This is the unforgettable account of one of the most severe child abuse cases in California history. It is the story of Dave Pelzer, who was brutally beaten and starved by his emotionally unstable, alcoholic mother: a mother who played torturous, unpredictable games – games that left him nearly dead. He had to learn how to play his mother's games in order to survive because she no longer considered him a son, but a slave; and no longer a boy, but an "it." This compelling story will awaken you to the truth about child abuse – and the ability we all have to make a difference.

### **A Shelter Is Not A Home Or Is It? Lessons from Family Homelessness in New York City**

*Ralph da Costa Nunez-2004*

By intertwining the past with a plan for the future, the author tells the story of family homelessness in New York City while highlighting what has been learned over the last twenty years. The evolution of New York City's shelter system, this work raises the question: have shelters become permanent fixtures on poverty's landscape? The author suggests that shelters are a surrogate for traditional low-income housing, and as such, offers a blue print for successfully moving families to of homelessness and into independence.

### **Abuse a Way of Life**

*Catharine Schneider, 2008*

Learning early in life not to be able to trust the men she loved, Catharine's life was a turbulent roller coaster ride. Her father was an alcoholic, her husband abusive. This autobiography, proved to be a unsettling experience. It was as if I was living through it all again; the pain, the heartache, and the suffering all came flooding back along with feelings of fear, helplessness, and despair. Enduring heartache after heartache, Catharine forged on searching for the happiness she deserved.

### **Abuse How to Get Out and Stay Out**

*Jane Boucher, 2008*

This book will be especially helpful to: **You**, because you have made the decision to leave and you sincerely want to stay gone. **Anyone**, who's been touched in any way by domestic violence.

**Employers**, domestic violence doesn't stay home when its victims go to work. Often, the offender follows, resulting in violence in the workplace.

### **Abuse and Violence Information for Teens**

*Sandra Augustyn Lawton, 2007*

This teen health series, provides basic health information for teens about risk factors, consequences, and prevention of various types of abuse and violent behaviors. Included are facts about the warning signs of abusive and violent behavior, health concerns of victims, and getting help and staying safe.

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### **Abused BOYS: The Neglected Victims of Sexual Abuse**

*Mic Hunter, 1990*

The sexual abuse of boys is a problem that has remained veiled in myth and misinformation for far too long. While the sexual abuse of female children has been widely documented, there are lingering assumptions that the sexual abuse of male children is rare, that the consequences are less serious than for girls, and even that boy's share responsibility with their perpetrators. In this long overdue book, psychologist Mic Hunter, who has extensive clinical experience treating male victims of child sexual abuse, explores these and other myths and offers an overview of the recovery process.

### **Abused Men: The Hidden Side of Domestic Violence**

*Philip Cook, 1997*

When most people think of domestic violence, images of battered women or abused children come to mind. But there is another side to this issue that is not as familiar--abused men. This unique book is the first to comprehensively examine this important but neglected social issue. Already praised by a diverse spectrum of readers--from "Dear Abby's" Abigail Van Buren, to the nation's leading domestic violence researcher, to those in law enforcement and counseling--this work is sure to spark controversy and discussion. It offers gripping, emotional stories, self-help for victims, and provocative insight into public issues, and provides a basic reference source for professionals. Abused Men presents practical solutions for reducing domestic violence, whether its victims are male or female.

### **Abusive Personality, The**

*Donald Dutton, 1998*

Physical violence may be the most overt manifestation of relationship abuse, but maltreatment of intimate partners takes many other forms as well. This integrative work explores the nature of male abusiveness by focusing on the development of a particular personality constellation--one that is easily threatened, jealous, and fearful, and that masks these emotions with anger and demands for control. Presenting results of controlled research with over 400 batterers, Dutton shows that many abusers exhibit high levels of trauma symptoms. This symptomology is cogently linked to elements of childhood experience including witnessing of violence, the use of shaming techniques by parents, and insecure attachment; and, in turn, to such characteristics as terror of abandonment and the inability to regulate one's emotions or deal with conflict effectively. A concluding chapter focuses on treatment.

### **Acts of Faith: Daily Meditations for People of Color**

*Iyanla Vanzant, 1993*

This book is divided into four sections which represent the four basic areas that create stress and imbalance for people of color: the relationship one has with herself, with the world, with each other, and with money. Each section will provide you with offerings to consider and put to use in restructuring your approach and your perceptions.

### **Addictions & Trauma Recovery: Healing the Body, Mind, & Spirit**

*Dusty Miller & Laurie Guidry, 2001*

Breakthrough studies in recent years have identified the need for treatment programs which focus the crossover issues of trauma and addiction. In this book, the authors present a comprehensive recovery model which blends psycho-educational, process, and expressive activities to assess the effects of trauma on the body, mind, and spirit.

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## **Advocacy in the Human Services**

*Mark Ezell, 2001*

The purpose of this book is to educate students and professionals so that they have a deeper understanding of advocacy practice in order to full serve clients. Included in this book: is a discussion on diversity/cultural awareness, a case study illustrating an advocacy effort from beginning to end, and a set of advocacy practice guidelines.

## **After Silence: Rape & My Journey Back**

*Nancy Venable Raine, 1998*

This book is Nancy Venable Raine's eloquent, profoundly moving response to her rapist's command to "shut up," a command that is so often echoed by society and internalized by rape victims. Beginning with her assault by a stranger in her home in 1985, Raine's riveting narrative of the ten-year aftermath of her rape brings to light the truth that survivors of traumatic experiences know – a trauma does not end when you find yourself alive. For anyone who has suffered from or witnessed the shattering effects of rape, this story inspires and points the way to healing.

## **After the Nightmare: The Treatment of Non-Offending Mothers of Sexually Abused Children**

*Wendy Ovaris, 1991*

Helps non-offending mothers who suffer because of their children being sexually abused by someone in their families and provides guidelines for therapists in assisting these mothers to deal with the aftermath of their children's sexual abuse. This book will increase sensitivity and understanding regarding non-offending mothers while enhancing the quality of services available to them.

## **Algo Anda Mal En Mi Casa**

*Diane Davis, 1984*

This is the Spanish language version of the book, *Something is Wrong At My House*. Based on a true story about a boy living in a violent household, the purpose of this book is to help break the generational cycle of violence. *Algo Anda Mal En Mi Casa* will help all children by giving them permission to have feelings, acknowledge those feelings, and make decisions about how they wish to act on them. This book was designed for use with both preschool and school age children.

## **Allies in Healing: When the Person You Love was Sexually Abused as a Child**

*Laura Davis, 1991*

This book, written by the author of *The Courage to Heal Workbook*, is based on in-depth interviews and Davis' workshops for partners across the country. She offers practical advice and encouragement to all partners – girlfriends, boyfriends, spouses and lovers – trying to support the survivors in their lives while tending to their own needs along the way. She shows couples how to deepen compassion, improve communication and develop an understanding of healing as a shared activity.

## **Answering the Call: The Police Response to Care Giver and violence against People with Disabilities**

*L'Institut Roeher Institue, 1993*

This study looks at the policing process around violent victimization of people with disabilities. It explores awareness and knowledge in the police community about these issues and points to the challenges people with disabilities face in reporting violent crimes against themselves to police.

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### **Assessing Woman Battering in Mental Health Services: A Clinical Response to a Social Problem**

*Edward W. Gondolf, 1998*

In this book, the author discusses the issues underlying the identification and assessment of battered women and assists clinicians in providing an appropriate and safe response to them. Included are ways to build collaboration that improves assessment and referrals, and issues involved when assessing women of different racial backgrounds.

### **Associated Press Stylebook and Briefing on Media Law**

*Editor: Norm Goldstein-2000*

The “journalist bible and essential handbook for all writers, editors, students, and public relations specialists. It’ll give you the references you need to accurately write about the world today. A-Z’s entries laying out the AP’s rules on grammar, spelling, punctuation, capitalizations, abbreviations, and word and numeral usage, Internet language, and search techniques, language to avoid common trademarks and the unique guidelines for business and sports reporting.

### **Awakening to Disability: Nothing About Us Without Us**

*Karen G. Stone, 1997*

From a disability activist and columnist comes this heartwarming compendium of her thoughts. This book chronicles Stones journey from “disability shame “to “disability pride”, and discusses the experience of disability in our lives. In addition, it opens the door of communication to encourage dialogue between the disabled and non-disabled.

### **Balancing the Power: Creating a Crisis Center Accessible to People with Disabilities**

*ASAP, Safe Place , 2006*

This book presents, a systematic guide for domestic violence and sexual assault centers aiming to provide accessible services to abuse survivors with disabilities. “*Balancing the Power*” includes strategies for working with people with various types of disabilities, including tips for adhering to the American with Disabilities Act. This book was written with input and advice from people with disabilities, crisis workers, disability service staff, and disability rights advocates from across the country.

### **Battered Black Women and Welfare Reform: Between a Rock and a Hard Place**

*SUNY Press, 2006*

This timely and compelling ethnography examines the impact of welfare reform on women seeking to escape domestic violence. Dana-Ain Davis profiles twenty-two women, thirteen of whom are Black, living in a battered women’s shelter in a small city in upstate New York. She explores the contradictions between welfare reform’s supposed success in moving women off of public assistance and toward economic self-sufficiency and the consequences welfare reform policy has presented for Black women fleeing domestic violence. Focusing on the intersection of poverty, violence, and race, she demonstrates the differential treatment that Black and White women face in their entanglements with the welfare bureaucracy by linking those entanglements to the larger political economy of a small city, neoliberal social policies, and radicalized ideas about Black women as workers and mothers.

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### **Battered Woman Syndrome, The**

*Lenore E Walker, Ed.D.-1984*

A research project to identify key psychological and sociological factors that compose the battered woman syndrome, test specific theories and collect comprehensive data on battered women.

### **Battered Women & Feminist Lawmaking**

*Elizabeth M. Schneider, 2000*

Women's rights advocates have long argued that violence against women denies women equality and citizenship, but it took a movement of feminist activists and lawyers to set about realizing this vision and transforming domestic violence from a private problem into a public harm. This book examines the legal process which has brought the pervasiveness and severity of domestic violence to public attention.

### **Battered Women as Survivors: An Alternative to Treating Learned Helplessness**

*Edward W. Gondolf & Ellen R. Fisher, 1988*

In this book, the author's present fresh empirical research that counters the popular "learned helplessness" theory with evidence that battered women are, in fact, help seekers who persistently search for resources and support services. They also discuss several heretofore "accepted" modes of thinking, such as: victimization, help seeking, battered women vs. batterers, and community service delivery.

### **Battered Women in the Courtroom: The Power of Judicial Responses**

*James Ptacek, 1999*

Recent laws have given women much needed rights in seeking protection from abusive men, but judges still hold the authority to issue restraining orders or send batterers to jail. In this book, the author looks at the types of violence that women report to the courts, and analyzes how judges exercise their authority in restraining order hearings. Also discussed is how judges perceive their role in negotiations with women, and their impact on women's efforts to escape the social entrapment of violence.

### **Battered Women, Children, and Welfare Reform: The Ties That Bind**

*Ruth A. Brandwein, 1999*

Developed by leading interdisciplinary academics, practitioners, advocates, and policy makers, this book explores various threads that tie family violence to welfare. Topics covered include: how public assistance can provide the financial support necessary to escape domestic violence; how batterers restrict their partner's job and educational opportunities, preventing them from leaving the welfare rolls; how child support regulations require disclosure of information that may increase the danger of family violence; and how child abuse is linked to the need for welfare.

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### **Battered Women Who Kill**

*Charles Patrick Ewing, 1987*

Ewing's account draws on psychological studies of battered women as homicide defendants as well as on his original analysis of over 100 recent cases. He describes the kinds of abuse these women suffer, the characteristics of the relationship that culminate in the killing of the batterer, and current legal responses to these killings. He argues that most of these women kill to prevent their batterers from destroying them psychologically, and discusses the practicality of this defense.

### **Batterer as Parent: Addressing the Impact of Domestic Violence on Family Dynamics, The**

*Lundy Bancroft & Jay G. Silverman, 2002*

This book takes the reader inside homes affected by domestic violence to impart an understanding of the atmosphere that battering men create for the children who live with them. The authors show how partner abuse affects each relationship in a family; explain how children's emotional recovery is linked to the healing of their mothers; and discuss the post-separation parenting behaviors of men who batter, including their use of custody litigation as a tool of abuse.

### **Batterer Intervention Systems: Issues, Outcomes, and Recommendations**

*Edward W. Gondolf, 2002*

This book takes research from a multi-site evaluation of batterer programs to critique current experimental evaluation practices and present alternatives to assessing effectiveness of batterer's treatment programs. A four-year follow-up of program participants is also examined.

### **Beating the Devil Out of Them: Corporal Punishment in American Families**

*Murray A. Straus, 1994*

Based on his studies of over nine thousand families, Straus describes the extent to which parents in the United States use corporal punishment (such as spanking and slapping) and its effects on their children. He contends that this believed-to-be-"minor" form of physical violence is the precursor to much of the violence that plagues our world.

### **Beauty Bites Beast: Awakening the Warrior within Women and Girls**

*Ellen Snortland, 1998*

The author, a self-defense instructor, takes on the politics of learned helplessness and clears a path back to natural female strength. This book is a call to "sleeping beauties" to wake up and take charge of their own self-defense, both verbal and physical, offering explanations and solutions for self-protection.

### **Behind Closed Doors: Violence in the American Family**

*Murray A. Straus, Richard J. Gelles, & Suzanne K. Steinmetz, 1980*

An unprecedented national survey of the extent, patterns, and causes of violence in the American family, this book is based on a seven-year study of over 2,000 families. It provides landmark insights into the phenomenon of American violence and its causes, and gives a complete report on child abuse, spousal abuse and other expressions of family violence.

### **Best of the Board Café Hands On Solutions for Non Profit Boards, The**

*Jan Masaoka-2003*

Written for both the new board member and the veteran, this book is just-in-time guide to the issues at hand. This compilation of articles provides practical, hands-on advice for board members, executive directors, and other staff. Examples throughout the book are based on real-life organizations.

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### **Beyond Labels Working with Abuse Survivors with Mental Illness Symptoms or Substance Abuse Issues**

*Diane King Akers, M.Ed. & Michelle "Shell" Schwartz, M.A.  
& Wendie H. Abramson, LMSW-2007*

This book provides practical information, tools, and resources for domestic violence and rape crisis center staff. The book explores the strong connection between trauma, mental illness and substance abuse; provides strategies for creating a welcoming and trauma-informed approach to service provision; and offers tips for working with survivors who are experiencing depression, anxiety, dissociation, psychosis and self-injury, suicidal thoughts and substance abuse.

### **Beyond the Shelter Wall: Homeless Families Speak Out**

*Ralph da Costa Nunez -2004*

This book gives readers a rare look at the other side of homelessness, the side that goes beyond a single need for housing. The women depicted in this book describe the confusion, challenges, and desperation that brought them to the shelter system. At a time when family homelessness has reached an all-time high, these first-hand accounts provide insight and clarity into the growing epidemic of America's poorest.

### **Big Help Book, The**

*Alan Goodman, 1994*

The *Big Help Book* is a guide created for kids who want to make the world a better place by volunteering. "Share, clean, fix, visit, care, give, do"--this book is loaded with ideas. And, everything you need to know is here: how to get started, what other kids are doing, how to form a group, and projects for kids and their friends.

### **Bill Bryson's, A Writers Guide to Getting It Right+**

*Bill Bryson-2002*

Bill Bryson felt keenly the lack of an easy-to-consult, authoritative guide to avoiding the traps and snares in English, and so he brashly suggests to a publisher that he should write one. The book contains a helpful glossary and guide to punctuation. Bill Bryson is considered to be one of the most skilled and beloved writers.

### **Binocular Vision Featuring Genesis 1-5**

*Jeanette J. Green, Eddy. 2005*

Binocular Vision is a book of basics. The author explores the Biblical basis of creation and human existence with a fresh, new look. Through a sort of binocular vision using two angels instead of one (men's and women's eyes, instead of men's only), the author challenges the reader to plumb and examine the scripture.

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### **Book of David, The**

*Basic Books, 2007*

The tragedy of abused children who have been failed by child welfare agencies is made palpable in the case presented here, followed by a specialist in family violence. Gelles, director of the Family Violence Research Program at the University of Rhode Island, examines the brief life of David, who died of suffocation at 15 months—one of the many children killed by their parents in the U.S. each year. Though previously reported as an abused child whose older sibling had earlier been removed from the family, David was nonetheless allowed to remain with his biological parents. The author attacks this operating principle of social service agencies that claims children are better off with their own families than with other caregivers. It is his documented observation that the central mission of child welfare agencies—preserving families—does not work. In tracing the system's tragic failure to save a child, Gelles sounds a wake-up call to agencies to put children first and reassess the efficacy of family preservation programs.

### **Boys Will Be Men: Raising Our Sons for Courage, Caring and Community**

*Paul Kivel, 1999*

This book gives the reader a powerful vision of raising our sons to be the critically thinking, socially invested men we need for a multicultural and democratic society. The author provides practical tools to empower boys to take the courageous step out of the “act like a man” box and become allies to themselves, each other, and all those who are vulnerable to violence and injustice in our society.

### **Breaking the Silence: Older Women**

*Minnesota Department of Corrections, 1987*

This book examines seven personal accounts of older women in abusive relationships, along with reflections and resources.

### **Butterfly Moon, An Incest Survivor's Therapeutic Journey,**

*Ann Tuller, M.A. and Curtis Brand Ph.d., 2007*

*Butterfly Moon*, is the true story of Ann Tuller's life. On the edge of insanity, Ann enters therapy, and the horror of her childhood is recalled bit by bit, as her mind releases her recollections into the therapeutic process. She remembers that her mother tried to murder her. She remembers that her father sexually abused her repeatedly. She comes to understand why she was never eleven years old and why she couldn't see colors.

### **Called to Account**

*M'Liss Switzer with Katherine Hale, 1987*

This book is the story of one family's struggle to overcome domestic violence. M'Liss Switzer was a battered wife for twenty years, and she takes you through her frustrations of dealing with law enforcement agencies and the judicial system, and discusses the experience of her participation in a comprehensive therapy program. This is Switzer's story of a successful struggle to end her husband's violence toward her and to help him come to terms with, and change, his behavior.

### **Can I Help? Helping the Hearing Impaired in Emergency Situations**

*S. Harold Collins, 1993*

This book provides an introduction to sign language and the use of pictures for demonstration. It can serve as assistance to an advocate in helping someone who is hearing impaired.

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### **Chain, Chain, Change: For Black Women Dealing with Physical & Emotional Abuse**

*Evelyn C. White, 1985*

This book is for the black woman who wants to understand the role of emotional abuse and violence in her life, and for the activist and professional who works with domestic violence. It discusses stereotypes and cultural assumptions and offers advice on getting support from emergency agencies, the legal system, shelters, counselors, and the church. It also exposes the cultural and institutional barriers that black women face and offers an opportunity for a new understanding.

### **Chain, Chain, Change: For Black Women in Abusive Relationships**

*Evelyn C. White, 1994*

This book offers supportive, practical information for African-American women who are or have been in a physically or emotionally abusive relationship. Written by a well-known writer and speaker on Black women's physical and emotional health, this book provides information on identifying the different aspects of abuse, the effects of domestic violence on the family, the impact of racism and sexism, and suggestions for how to reach out for help and get positive support from emergency agencies, shelter, the legal system, counselors, the church, family and friends. A new chapter addressing the experiences of Black lesbians who are battered by their partners is included in this expanded edition.

### **Changing Violent Men**

*R. Emerson Dobash, Russell P. Dobash, Kate Cavanagh, Ruth Lewis-2000*

This book seeks to answer the question "What, if anything, works and why?" In examining the effectiveness of two court-mandated abuser programs, compared with more traditional justice sanctions such as fines, probation, and others, the authors provide: Detailed descriptions of the nature of violence. Considerations of interventions with violent men, particularly abuser programs that focus on whether violent men can change. Theorizing; about the process of personal change among those men who do not change their behavior.

### **Child Abuse, Domestic Violence, and Animal Abuse**

*Edited by Frank R. Ascione & Phil Arkow-1999*

This interdisciplinary sourcebook of original essays examines the relations between animal maltreatment and human interpersonal violence, expands the scope of research in this growing area, and provides practical assessment and documentation strategies

### **Child Custody & Domestic Violence: A Call For Safety and Accountability**

*Peter G. Jaffe, Nancy K. D. Lemon, Samantha E. Poisson-2003*

This book focuses on the complexity of the challenges facing judges, lawyers, legislators, and mental health professionals in developing safe and effective strategies for resolving custody disputes. The authors outline the essential differences between custody disputes with and without allegations and findings of domestic violence.

### **Childhood Experiences of Domestic Violence**

*Caroline McGee, 2000*

Based on the first-hand accounts of children and their mothers regarding both domestic violence and support services, this book examines children's experiences of a range of service provision in response to domestic violence. Drawing on a three-year research project into domestic violence and the support and protection of children, this book explores: the types of violence experienced by mothers and witnessed by children; the types of abuse children are subjected to; children's understanding of domestic violence; and the barriers for children and mothers to seeking help. It

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will also assess the role and response of various service providers, describe approaches to existing problems, emphasize the importance of a child-focused response, and conclude by recommending improvements for policy and practice.

### **Children and Inter parental Violence: the Impact of Exposure**

*B.B. Robbie Rossman, Honore M. Hughes, & Mindy S. Rosenberg, - 2000*

This book focuses on children's exposure to violence between their caretakers and pays specific attention to families' ethnic backgrounds, parents' sexual orientation, and forensic and legal issues. Prevention and intervention models, techniques, and programs are discussed, as well as research evaluating their usefulness.

### **Children's Perspectives on Domestic Violence**

*Audrey Mullender, Gill Hague, Umme Imam, Liz Kelly, Ellen Malos, and Linda Regan-2002*

Drawing on the newest research designed to hear the voices of children and young people, this important book examines children's experiences and perspectives on living with domestic violence. The effects of domestic violence on children, what children say would help them most in coping with domestic violence, and the advice children would offer other children who find themselves in similar circumstances.

### **Children Who See Too Much: Lessons from the Child Witness to Violence Project**

*Betsy McAlister Groves-2002*

In this book, Betsy Groves shows how children understand, respond to, and are affected by violence, especially domestic violence. Groves makes the powerful case that traumatic events carried out by family members carry the most severe psychological risks for very young children. She uses clinical case studies to show that being young does not protect against the lasting effects of witnessing violence, and she offers ways adults can help.

### **Church of Lies**

*Flora Jessop & Paul T. Brown*

This is an important book that sheds light on an ultra-authoritarian secretive community in our midst. Flora Jessop spares no punches in telling her story and describing life in the FLDS, especially the hazards for women and children. A must-read for anyone interested in children's rights, victims rights, and just plain human decency.

### **Class Action: The Story of Lois Jenson & the Landmark Case that Changed Sexual Harassment Law**

*Clara Bingham & Laura Leedy Gansler, 2002*

This book tells the dramatic and ultimately affirming story of the first sexual harassment class action

case that changed the American workplace.

### **Codependency Sucks**

*Linda Meyerholz, M.S., 1999*

Meyerholz studies how the science/religion split of the 16<sup>th</sup> century put western civilization on a path leading to the way we behave in relationships today. She argues that codependent relationships are the natural result of distorted teachings that have been handed down to us throughout the generations, and discusses possible solutions.

### **Coercive Control, How Men Entrap Women in Personal Life**

*Evan Stark-2007*

The author presents a provocative argument—he documents by showing that interventions have failed to improve women's long-term safety in relationships or to hold perpetrators accountable.

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Stark traces this failure to a startling paradox, that the singular focus on violence against women masks an even more devastating reality. In millions of abusive relationships, men use a largely unidentified form of subjugations that more closely resembles kidnapping or indentured servitude than assault. He calls this pattern coercive control.

### **Coloring Our Human Rights / Colorear Nuestros Derechos Humanos**

*Peace At Home Inc., 2000*

This bilingual coloring book serves as a tool for violence prevention and intervention. By creating a foundation for our children to understand that they deserve to live with respect and dignity, free from fear, we can break the cycle of violence. This coloring book may be used as an educational tool for children who are living at home, in shelter, or in transitional housing facilities.

### **Community Activism & Feminist Politics: Organizing Across Race, Class, & Gender**

*Nancy A. Naples, 1998*

Linking the theoretical with the practical, this collection of essays focuses on the complex ways that gender, race, ethnicity, culture, class, sexuality and region shape women's coalition building throughout the United States. Topics discussed include: homophobia, racism, civil rights, economic security, educational equity, and environmental justice.

### **Community Research as Empowerment: Feminist Links, Postmodern Interruptions**

*Janice L. Ristock & Joan Pennell, 1996*

This volume invites readers to take part in reshaping the process of research aimed at social action through critical analysis of the power dynamics. Encouraging the development of "feminist" links, at the same time it stresses the importance of "postmodern interruptions": the contradictions and gaps that a postmodern perspective reveals, which prevent inappropriate fixation on any one "solution" to complex social problems. The authors present detailed examples drawn from their own work, and specific research instruments used in this work are included. This book will demonstrate how researchers can help to create inclusive communities, affirming individual differences, while disrupting the socially constructed categories that work against empowerment.

### **Confidentiality & Privacy in Social Work: A Guide to the Law for Practitioners and Students**

*Donald T. Dickson, Ph.D., 1998*

This book presents an overview of confidentiality and privacy issues for social workers. The author discusses the law of confidentiality in detail, necessitating a clear explanation of what a promise of confidentiality may mean. Also covered are issues around access to specific types of records, the use of dual record keeping, releases, subpoenas, and record retention and destruction.

### **Confronting Chronic Neglect: The Education & Training of Health Professionals on Family Violence**

*Institute of Medicine, 2002*

This book addresses some of the barriers to screening for domestic violence by health care professionals. It offers specific recommendations for raising awareness of the issue of domestic violence, and discusses ways to involve health care professionals in assuming greater responsibility for responding to victims.

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### **Controlling People: How to Recognize, Understand and Deal with People Who Try to Control You**

*Patricia Evans, 2002*

In this book, the author tackles the “controlling personality,” and discusses how and why these people try to run other people’s lives. She explains the compulsion that causes such people to continue this behavior, and offers tips on how that pattern can be broken.

### **Creating Sanctuary Toward the Evolution of Sane Societies**

*Sandra Bloom, 1997*

Is our society traumatized? In this book, Bloom argues that our society is sick: we are emotionally numb, addicted to violence, alienated from each other, and ourselves and trapped in a vicious cycle of destructive behavior. By applying the successes from her treatment programs with severely traumatized individuals to larger group and social organizations, she offers insights into how we can create safe environments that promote well-being.

### **Crime & Elder Abuse: An Integrated Perspective**

*Brian K. Payne, Ph.D., 2000*

This book is based on the idea that as America’s elderly population increases, so will elderly victimization; and only through advanced understanding of the problem will policymakers, practitioners, and educators be prepared to limit the negative consequences associated with the victimization of older adults. Topics examined include: crimes committed against the elderly, victimization effects, intervention measures, and responding to crimes committed against the elderly.

### **Crimes Against Women**

*Diana E. H. Russell & Nicole Van de Ven, 1976*

A testimony of what happened at the Tribunal in Brussels on March, 4-8, 1976. The authors recreate the incidents, record the shocking personal testimony, discuss the resolutions and proposals for change, analyze the media’s response, and assess the impact of those five days when international feminism was born.

### **Crossing the Threshold: Female Officers and Police Perpetrated DV**

*Diane Wetendorf, 2005*

Crossing the Threshold examines how male police officers' institutional power filters down into their intimate relationships, and why the institution of policing has historically ignored or denied police-perpetrated violence against women. A brief look at the profession's historical treatment of women and minorities provides the background for this analysis of police-perpetrated domestic violence. Though the book focuses on female officers' experience of abuse at the hands of male officers and the institutional response to that abuse, the book is insightful and relevant reading for civilian victims, advocates, attorneys, police supervisors, administrators, chiefs and sheriffs.

### **Culture and Family Violence: Fostering Change through Human Rights Law**

*Roger J.R. Levesque, 2001*

This text discusses the idea of how human rights, by harnessing cultural forces, can influence how cultures define certain forms of violence, can serve as buffers from violence, and can determine the success of intervention efforts.

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### **Current Controversies on Family Violence**

*Donileen R. Loseke, Richard J. Gelles, Mary M. Cavanaugh, 2005*

This book contains thoughtful discussions that highlight the most current controversies, research, and policy directions in the family violence issue. This book is an accessible resource to readers who are not already experts in family violence.

### **Dance of Anger, The**

*Harriet G. Lerner, Ph.D., 1985*

In this guidebook, Lerner shows women how to turn anger into a constructive force for reshaping their lives. She shows the causes and patterns of anger and offers specific strategies for making meaningful and lasting changes in important relationships. Basing her findings on a decade of clinical investigation, she illustrates how and why our anger often protects rather than challenges existing relationship dynamics. She also explains the difficulties women have not only in getting angry but also in using their anger to gain a stronger and more independent sense of self.

### **Dangerous Dating: Helping Young Women Say No to Abusive Relationships**

*Patricia Riddle Gaddis, 2000*

This book offers tips and guidance for parents, counselors, and pastors on how to help teens avoid or break out of an abusive dating relationship. It provides information on how to judge the appropriateness of a relationship, how to respond when a young woman is in danger, and where to get help. The book also includes a tool for girls to assess their own relationships.

### **Dark Side of Families: Current Family Violence Research, The**

*David Finkelhor, Richard J. Gelles, Gerald T. Hotaling, & Murray A. Straus, 1983*

This book covers a broad spectrum of issues and controversies in wife abuse, child abuse, the sexual abuse of children and marital rape. This volume is a collection of writing by some of the best-known authorities on family violence and abuse.

### **Dating Violence: Young Women in Danger**

*Barrie Levy, 1998*

Today millions of young people are struggling with violence in their dating relationships. This book brings together professionals, activists, researchers, and young people to provide a comprehensive cross-cultural view of this problem. In first-person accounts of experiencing or witnessing abuse, teens and parents reveal the lethality of dating violence and the serious attention it demands.

### **Deaf, Dumb, and Black**

*Mary Miller-Hall, 1994*

This is a book about dysfunction within a family of two deaf African-American parents. Miller-Hall was born in Columbus, Ohio. Over the course of her lifetime; she suffered both physical and mental abuse. This is a tale of deprivation, hate, prejudice, restitution, incest, assault, fraud, theft of life, love and death. It covers many decades while the author attempts to dispel some of the pre-conceived ideas about deaf individuals. This book is not a novel, but an account of a family in distress.

### **Death from Child Abuse...And No One Heard: A True Story**

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*Eve Krupinski & Dana Weikel, 1985*

This book tells the terrible tragedy of a little girl, named Ursula Sunshine Assaid, through her own eyes. She was five years old when she died at the hands of her mother and stepfather after two months of prolonged abuse, ending in 55 hours of torture. In addition to the narrative section of the book, there is also a section on child abuse recognition, prevention, reporting, and treatment.

### **Development Plan, The**

*Linda Lysakowski, 2005*

Linda provides a very practical outlook on how to succeed in developing and implementing a fundraising plan for a nonprofit organization.

### **Diagnostic and Treatment Guidelines on Child Physical Abuse and Neglect**

*American Medical Association*

This book, was designed to be used by people in the medical profession as an educational tool about child abuse and neglect. It offers useful information about warning signs and symptoms and how to handle them.

*Sandra A. Graham-Bermann & Jeffrey L. Edleson, 2001*

This book charts new directions for productive research on the subject of children from violent homes, and integrates the separate areas of domestic violence and child maltreatment research. Discussions include: the best available measures and methods of analyzing data, the effectiveness of interventions, and implications for public policy.

### **Domestic Violence on Trial**

*Daniel Jay Sonkin, Ph.D., 1987*

Although testimony regarding battered woman syndrome has been admitted as evidence in homicide and assault trials in at least 22 states, several states have still not allowed such testimony. Laws regarding self-defense do not take sex differences into account, and as a result, women are often tried on male standards of behavior. This book raises these and other important issues regarding the battered woman's or child's experience in court. It is written primarily for mental health and legal professionals and paraprofessionals advocating for battered women and their children, but is also for anyone who has contact with battered women and children or male batterers.

### **Domestic Violence: the Criminal Justice Response**

*Eve S. Buzawa & Carl G. Buzawa, 1996*

In this book, the authors provide a brief theoretical overview of the causes of domestic violence and its prevalence in our society, and examine models of response by individual criminal justice institutions.

### **Domestic Violence: What Every Pastor Needs to Know**

*Reverend Al Miles, 2000*

Although victims of domestic violence turn to their pastors more than all other resources combined, clergy and other pastoral ministers have not been equipped to meet the challenge. The author's experience in years of working as a hospital chaplain has shown him the devastation wreaked in Christian families and the inadequacy of clergy when they are most needed. In this work, Miles lays out a theological framework that would enable them to obey the biblical mandate to rescue the victim from the hand of the violent, and to bring God's healing to all members of the family. He gives us the words of actual pastors, addresses persons of varying theological stripes and convictions, and offers biblical precepts and insights.

### **Double Vision: A Travelogue of Recovery from Ritual Abuse**

*Anna Richardson, 1997*

Double Vision is the story of a woman remembering the torture she suffered during childhood at the hands of an organized, secretive network of adults and about her struggle not to become one of the abusers; it is about organized cruelty and the necessity of naming evil. Through interweaving current observations with excerpts from journals she kept during the three years when the forgotten incidents of ritual abuse were surfacing, the author explores the nature of remembering, the thawing of experiences the psyche had kept in deep freeze, and the processes by which experience is transformed into memory.

### **Duty Bound: Elder Abuse and Family Care**

*Suzanne K. Steinmetz, 1988*

The methodology of this book examines the impact that caring for an elderly parent had on the lives of the middle-aged and older care giving offspring. The daily tasks that were provided for the

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elderly by these caregivers and the resulting stress, conflict, and abuse is detailed. The sacrifices that these 104 caregivers and their families made in order to care for the 119 elderly kin that composed the sample were remarkable. Although, in most of these instances the families were model caregivers, the psychological, verbal, and physical abuse that they perpetrated on the elders was astonishing.

### **Economic Independence for Women: The Foundation for Equal Rights**

*Jane Roberts Chapman, 1976*

Although women have entered the labor force by the millions in the postwar period, their overall economic condition is still characterized by dependency, poverty, low wages, tax and social security disincentives, and credit discrimination. This book examines the position of women as an economically disadvantaged group. It provides a statement of what the current economical condition of women is why it must be changed, and what the new policy initiatives should be.

### **Education Groups For Men Who Batter: The Duluth Model**

*Ellen Pence & Michael Paymar, 1993*

This book describes a major component of what has become known as the “Duluth Model.” It explains the methods used in work with men who batter and offers group process techniques for facilitators of men’s groups. This book offers insight into the complex nature of battering and of the man who batters—his thinking, the intent of his actions, and the impact of his violent behavior on the woman he batters, on his children, and ultimately on himself.

### **Effects of Intimate Partner Violence on Children, The**

*Haworth Press, 2003*

The Effects of Intimate Partner Violence on Children examines the short- and long-term developmental issues facing children exposed to violence in their own homes. The book addresses the growing concern for children at risk of suffering psychological, behavioral, social, and educational problems, and for the effects childhood maltreatment may have on their adult lives. An interdisciplinary panel of researchers, academicians, attorneys, clinicians, and practitioners discuss treatment programs, theoretical perspectives, research and methodological issues, assessment and intervention, and forensic issues, including child custody.

*Mary Joy Quinn, R.N., M.A. & Susan K. Tomita, M.S.W., 1986*

This book was written for anyone who works with elders and is concerned about their well-being; it is formed on the belief that unless there is widespread understanding of the phenomenon of elder abuse and neglect and society makes a commitment to reform, the abuse, exploitation, and suffering will continue. This work explores the nature of elder abuse, why and how older adults are abused. It provides guidelines for detection and effective intervention. Actual case examples from clinical experiences show how abuse looks from the clinical point of view, and detailed clinical protocols are included.

### **Elena and the Magic Beans / Elena y los frijoles magicos**

*Casa de Esperanza, 2007*

This is a bilingual storybook presenting a colorful portrayal of Elena, who learns about feelings, changes, and challenges when her family moves from Mexico City to the U.S.A. It is an ideal tool for children learning to communicate their feelings and strengthen their bonds with caring adults, while at the same time building on Latino cultural strengths.

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### **Emotional Abuse**

*Marti Tamm Loring, 1994*

This book discusses the powerful and insidious mechanisms of this subtle yet destructive type of abuse. It explores the components of emotional abuse, whether occurring alone or in the presence of physical abuse, and presents a new model for its treatment.

### **Emotionally Abused Woman, The**

*Beverly Engel, MFCC, 1990*

This book will teach advocates how to: recognize and understand emotional abusers, identify emotional abuse patterns, and heal the damage of abuse by building self-esteem.

### **Empowering Survivors of Abuse**

*Edited by Jacquelyn C. Campbell, 1998*

Written for health care professionals to gain the skills needed to effectively intervene in domestic violence cases, this book addresses issues and interventions specific to abused women of specific populations and includes chapters on adolescent, African American, Native American, Hispanic, migrant and rural women.

### **Enabler: When helping Harms the Ones You Love, The**

*Angelyn Miller, 1988*

Miller tells the story of her own family, in which her “enabling,” defined as protecting others from the consequences of their own behavior, was a source of major problems. Although enablers are often discussed within the context of substance abuse, Miller demonstrates that enabling can occur wherever there is dysfunctional behavior. Concrete strategies are offered for addressing the problem of enabling in the family unit.

### **Encouragements for the Emotionally Abused Woman**

*Beverly Engel, MFCC*

A volume of quotes, insights, feelings, and suggestions to heal and replenish the soul.

### **End the Pain: Solutions for Stopping Domestic Violence**

*Lynn Hawker, Ph.D. & Terry Bicehouse, B.S., 1995*

This book is practical, clinically tested, easy to read and an effective guide for taking direct action to resolve dysfunctional relationships. Through an understanding of the core motivations which lead to violent behavior in interpersonal relationships, the prescribed method can be utilized to deal with the immediate problem. Dr. Hawker uses exercises and case studies to raise key questions and to offer a practical and proven method for eliminating the present and future crisis of domestic violence.

The authors outline the new legal landscape that makes the madness possible and show how the system has failed to reform the family courts, with the goal of transforming them from instruments of punishment to true institutions of justice.

### **Getting Away with Murder: Weapons for the War Against Domestic Violence**

*Raoul Felder & Barbara Victor, 1996*

The authors in this book demonstrate that only a complete reform of society’s treatment of both victims and perpetrators can stop the violence. The author address everyone touched by the issue of domestic violence, from the police to friends and neighbors who witness or suspect abuse. They call for hospital personnel to report suspicious injuries and argue for stringent legal

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penalties, demonstrating the need to put prevention and protection before potentially dangerous concerns about privacy.

### **Getting by, Getting Ahead: Women's Stories of Welfare and Work**

*Lorraine Higgins and Lisa Brush, 2002*

This book presents a collection of short stories by women who are current and former welfare recipients. Each story is a story of trouble, but also one of tenacity and redemption.

### **Getting Free: A Handbook for Women in Abusive Relationships**

*Ginny NiCarthy, 1986*

This is a comprehensive, step-by-step guidebook for battered women and their families. This book takes the reader through the many facets of getting free from their abuser, and provides useful activities that will make this a resourceful workbook for classes and/or workshops.

### **Getting the Job You Really Want**

*Michael Farr, 1994*

For over 20 years, the author has refined techniques presented here, and they have helped over a million people find better jobs in less time. These techniques increase results in job search programs -- even in areas of high unemployment -- for career changers, students, unemployed professionals, and anyone planning a career or looking for a job. In a project demonstrating the techniques in this book, 96 percent of the participants got jobs in an average of 21 days. Remarkably, this occurred in the city with the highest unemployment rate at the time -- over 25 percent. ### **Handbook on Sexual Abuse of Children**

This handbook includes extensive and explicit assessment and treatment of children's sexual abuse issues. Recent findings regarding the immediate and long-term effects of sexual abuse on children will be reviewed, and an overview of the issues and controversies facing researchers who study the effects of sexual abuse on children will be discussed. Walker is a licensed psychologist who, with a team of domestic violence experts, compiled this handbook for all those who want assistance and support in the area of child sexual abuse.

### **Handbook of Group Play Therapy: How to Do It, How it Works, and Whom It's Best For**

*Daniel S. Sweeney & Linda E. Homeyer, 1999*

This book serves as a comprehensive guide to the childhood intervention technique group play therapy. It applies play therapy theory to a variety of group settings, and gives therapists insight into treating special populations, including children who have been abused.

### **Handbook of Strategic Public Relations & Integrated Communications The,**

*Clarke L Caywood, Ph.D., 1997*

Featuring the expertise of the world's foremost public relations and marketing authorities, it is the first book of its kind to combine the art and science of marketing, public relations and communication. ### **Harms Way: The Many Faces of Violence and Abuse against Persons with Disabilities**

The information in this book came from a Canadian survey of people with disabilities, along with interviews and focus group discussions with service providers, police, advocates, and family members. The study focused on violent or abusive circumstances experienced by individuals with disabilities and the impact of those acts on their lives. Factors that can contribute to violence and abuse are identified including negative social stereotypes concerning disability and having caregivers who may lack adequate training or support. Recommendations are offered for policy and program and statutory reform, as well as providing information to concerned parties and the public about the issue of abuse

### **Healing the Scars of Emotional Abuse**

*Gregory L Jantz PhD, 2003*

Dr. Gregory Jantz examines the pervasive yet overlook problem of emotional abuse - and why it is so common and damaging. This book will help you understand the effects of the abuse, give you insight into the problems of the abuser, and show you how to overcome the past.

### **Healing Your Life: Recovery from Domestic Abuse**

*Candace Hennekens, 1991*

This is a guide to bring victims of domestic violence through the stages of recovery. Hennekens approaches healing from many different directions and guides the reader through the ways to re-establish positive self-esteem. Topics covered include affirming yourself, dealing with your feelings, the dynamics of shame-based systems, career planning, goal setting, and establishing healthy relationships. 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### **Hell Is My Husband**

*Beverly Gaines, 1992*

Gaines shares her story of emotional and physical abuse. She alerts the reader to the daily subtle signs of abuse, and has also compiled several steps to take in order to get out of the abusive relationship. These steps include: knowing a safe place to go in an emergency, renting a Post Office box, hiding extra keys, compiling records of important information, and more.

### **Helping Battered Women: A Volunteer's Handbook**

*Alan W. McEvoy & Jeff B. Brookings, 1990*

Topics discussed in this handbook include: shelter-house organization, working with victims (including children), crisis hotlines, and dealing with your feelings.

### **Helping Her Get Free: A Guide for Families and Friends of Abused Women**

*Susan Brewster M.S.S.W., 2006*

The author wrote this book to give specific tools and ideas to anyone will to be that special person in an abused woman's life. Almost ten years after its original publication, this groundbreaking and practical guide remains a wise, informed, and vital resource for those who want to assist a friend or loved one in her struggle to escape an abusive relationship. Susan Brewster is a survivor of an abusive relationship, and has been a clinical social worker/psychotherapist for twenty-six years, ten of which have been devoted to working specifically in the area of domestic violence.

### **Helping Survivors of Domestic Violence: The Effectiveness of Medical, Mental Health, and Community Services**

*Judith S. Gordon, 1998*

This report presents the findings of a study done to assess the adequacy and efficacy of community and professional services used by battered women in Western and Central Oregon.

### **Helping Teens Stop Violence: A Practical Guide for Counselors, Educators, and Parents**

*Allan Creighton and Paul Kivel, 1992*

This book is a guide to a multi-racial program which empowers young people to resist abuse and prevent violence in their relationships. Topics include: talking about violence in the classroom, strategies to support peer counselors (teens working with other teens), guidelines for adults setting up teen support groups, and steps to follow when helping teens who have been abused.

### **Hey, Grey! It's Not My Fault**

*Mary Jane O'Shea, 1985*

This is a book for children who have been physically hurt by a parent or family member. It is a story of what happened to one girl when her Dad struck out in anger and she became the target. There are several ways to use *Hey Grey!*—the book maybe given to a child to read on his own or share by an adult.

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### **Hiding Behind a Smile: Disguising Our Deepest Feelings**

*Yvonne Elizabeth, 1994*

Elizabeth writes a collection of poems depicting her life growing up with an alcoholic father and a sexually abusive uncle. She writes through the eyes of the child that was terrorized and eventually faces the people –those who have hurt her and so callously broken her spirit – with the truth. She manages to build a bridge of hope and healing that leads to a productive future for her self and for others.

### **Homophobia: A Weapon of Sexism**

*Suzanne Pharr, 1988*

This book offers an analysis of why homophobia exists and the way it works. It explores the effect of homophobia on women's liberation and strategies for eliminating homophobia in our personal lives and in women's organizations. Pharr also examines the common elements of oppressions (sexism, racism, etc.), our own internalized homophobia, and strategies for setting ourselves free.

### **How Little We Knew**

*Dee Ann Miller, 1993*

This book is the true story of the author, a wife and daughter of a minister, who was sexually assaulted on the mission field by a fellow missionary. Her initial response was to remain silent - until she discovered that she was not alone. When she finally found the courage to speak out, she was horrified by the response. The organization, shocked by the revelations, refused to deal with the perpetrator and attempted to cover up the incidences. This book exposes the re-victimization by the family and the system, and serves as a clarion call to the Church to address and end the evil of sexual abuse- particularly when it occurs within its own ranks.

### **How To Stop A Stalker**

*Mike Proctor, 2003*

This book, written by a veteran detective, discusses what to do if you are being stalked. He discusses how to identify a stalker, how they stalk and why they do it, what to do if you are being stalked, how to collect evidence, how to get the justice system on your side, and what to do in court.

### **Human Resources Kit For Dummies**

*Max Messmer, 2007*

Looking to stay on top of today's complex HR management tasks? This practical guide provides the tools you need to keep you HR administrations running smoothly and the latest techniques for motivating your work force.

### **I Can Make My World A Safer Place: A Kid's Book About Stopping Violence**

*Paul Kivel, 2001*

This book is written for children ages 6 to 11years old. It explains the difference between public danger and private danger, and provides sensitive and simple information about physical, sexual, and emotional violence. This guide will help adults and children develop a plan of action for staying safe and getting help when violence erupts.

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### **I Closed my Eyes: Revelations of a Battered Woman**

*Michele Weldon, 1999*

This book tells the author's story of living with her abusive husband for nine years. As she takes the reader through their marriage, good times and bad, she demonstrates that ultimately all women have the power to trade in the role of victim for that of survivor.

### **I Love a Cop: What Police Families Need to Know**

*Ellen Kirschman, Ph.D., 1997*

Provides insight to issues of police families including domestic violence. This book is designed to help cops and their loved ones cope with the stress of police life and work. Filled with practical information and guidance, it serves as an aid to both problem prevention and problem solving.

### **I Love My Dad But...**

*Leslie Wright, 1991*

Every day children of all ages witness their mother being assaulted in the home, and many have been told they must keep the violence a secret. This book was written as a tool to help children talk about the violence they've witnessed at home—encouraging children's participation in the healing process and providing a safe medium to explore their feelings and concerns.

### **I Saw It Happen**

*Wendy Deaton, 2007*

A work book for children who have witnessed a traumatic event such as a shooting at school, a frightening accident, or other violence.

### **If I Tell**

*Susan Marcy-Webster & Dr. Emily Phillips, 2007*

*If I Tell* is the story of an adolescent girl who is sexually abused by a family member. The book describes the psychological manipulation used by the perpetrators and gives a look inside the victim's thought process as she struggles with whether to disclose the abuse.

### **If She Is Raped: A Book for Husbands, Fathers, and Male Friends**

*Alan W. McEvoy & Jeff B. Brookings, 1984*

This book will give husbands, fathers, and male friends of rape victims an understanding of the dynamics of rape from the woman's point of view, and will suggest practical ways for them to help in her recovery. It will help in understanding what happens from the time of the rape until well after the possible rape trial, and will help the loved ones deal with their own feelings about the rape incident and its consequences.

### **If This Is Love, Why Am I So Lonely?**

*Helene C. Parker, Ph.D., 1996*

This book empowers individuals to go after exactly what they want in a relationship, urging readers not to feel guilty for meeting their own needs. Topics discussed include: relationship patterns that never work, signs of an unhealthy and healthy relationship, and twenty ways to ruin a relationship.

### **If You Are Raped: What Every Woman Needs to Know**

*Kathryn M. Johnson, 1985*

This book examines why rape occurs, how it can be prevented, and what to do if you are raped. The health and well being of all rape victims depends upon what they do and think after the rape

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occurs. This book will help you understand those behaviors, thoughts, and feelings. Also, it will help rape victims learn how to get valuable counseling, medical care, and legal assistance.

### **Impact of Family Violence on Children and Adolescents**

*Javad H. Kashani & Wesley D. Allen, 1998*

This book examines the impact of family violence on children and adolescents. It presents various definitions of family violence, along with theories for the origin of the problem. The authors discuss different types of interfamilial violence and the effects of each on adolescents. ### **In Love and In Danger: A Teen's Guide to Breaking Free of Abusive Relationships**

Many teenagers tell their personal stories in this book, describing how their romantic relationships became hurtful and/or dangerous, and how they were able to break free from them. This book will help teenagers experiencing abuse to understand their own situation and learn how to get help.

### **Innocent Victims, The: A Handbook for Parents and Caregivers of Children Exposed to Domestic Violence**

*Julianne Leavy, MA, MFT, 2003*

This book presents a basic overview of the effects of domestic violence on children, with information organized into the following sections: Understanding Children's Behavior; How to Talk and Be With Our Children; and, Leaving an Abusive Home.

### **In the Company of Women: Voices from the Women's Movement**

*Bonnie Watkins & Nina Rothchild, 1996*

This book is a collection of compelling personal stories told by 83 women, describing how they became feminists and how the women's movement changed forever the way they see themselves and the world around them.

### **Intimate Partner Violence**

*Angela J. Hattery, 2009*

Until recently, domestic violence—as it has been referred to—was a problem to be dealt with inside the family. The author's unique approach provides a detailed discussion of race, class, and gender effects on intimate partner violence and dispels the common, dangerously mistaken notion that intimate partner violence, is a personal matter, and addresses IPV as a matter of public safety and not just a women's problem.

*Ola W. Barnett & Alyce D. LaViolette, 2000*

Directed at mental and social service practitioners, this book argues against blaming women for their victimization. It provides comprehensive and current theories on why women stay in abusive relationships – and why they leave. It also examines learned helplessness, learned hopefulness, fear, posttraumatic stress, and the Battered Women's Syndrome through specific case studies.

### **It is in our hands: Stop Violence Against Women**

*Amnesty International, 2004*

Investigates causes, forms and remedies, explores the relationship between violence against women and poverty, discrimination and militarization. It highlights the responsibility of the state, the

### **It's My Life Now: Starting Over: After an Abusive Relationship or Domestic Violence**

*Meg Kennedy Dugan, M.A. & Roger R. Hock, Ph.D., 2000*

The purpose of this book is to offer encouragement and practical advice to women who have survived an abusive relationship and who seek to repair their self-esteem, assess their safety, and move on to better lives. It offers guidance to help women conquer emotional pain, confront feelings of loss, and deal effectively with the practical considerations of a new life, including child care, personal safety, and financial matters.

### **Job Smarts: 12 Steps to Job Success**

*Dixie Lee Wright, 2004*

All essential job search and job retention topics are covered, and the material is presented in a simplified and visual way, with text written at a fifth-grade reading level. The result? The content is very accessible for youth and adults with special needs, especially people with lower-level reading skills. For instructional settings with more advanced students, optional worksheets are included. Covers: Preferences and kinds of jobs available for various skill levels, finding job openings, writing resumes and cover letters, filling out applications, what causes people to get fired, what good teamwork is like, and how to make a good impression during an interview.

### **Keeping the Faith: Guidance for Christian Women Facing Abuse**

*Marie M. Fortune, 1987*

Written by an ordained minister, this book discusses the needs of women in the faith community. It addresses such questions as: what guidance does Scripture give the battered woman? What is God's will for her? How can she deal with this situation in her life as a Christian woman? The author responds to these and many more questions, distortions, and misconceptions in hopes that this book will enable other Christian abused women to keep the faith – both with them selves and with God.

### **Last Time I Wore a Dress, The**

*Daphne Scholinski with Jane Meredith Adams, 1997*

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This is the true story of Daphne Scholinski who, at age fifteen, was committed to a mental hospital for what the doctors called “Gender Identity Disorder”. They described her treatment goals as becoming more obsessive about boys, learning more about make-up, dressing more like a girl, curling and styling hair, and spending quality time learning about “girl things” with peers. Thousands of teenagers are still institutionalized in the United States each year for being too sissyish or too much of a tomboy – this is just one of the stories of this shameful medical practice that has destroyed countless childhoods.

### **Latino Families and Domestic Violence: A Guide for Systems and Organizations Committed to Serving Latino Communities**

*Casa De Esperanza, 2006*

Casa de Esperanza designed this video as a companion piece to the manual, Latino Families and Domestic Violence: A Guide for Systems and Organizations Committed to Serving Latino Communities. Written primarily for service providers working with Latino clients, both products are informative for anyone seeking to relate effectively with Latino communities and understand issues facing battered Latinas and their children.

### **Laying Down My Burden**

*Brenda L. Thomas*

*Phillywriter, 2006*

“Laying Down My Burden”, is a gritty and deeply moving depiction of the author’s struggle with domestic violence and its threats to her self-esteem. A memoir that tells a frighteningly familiar tale that takes a positive turn as Thomas overcomes a number of obstacles to become an independent, successful woman.

### **Leaving Abusive Partners**

*Catherine Kirkwood, 1993*

The author of this book draws on her first-hand accounts to go beyond the discourse of “victims” and “survivors” to offer new insights into the very specific and multi-faceted nature of the abuses women experience – emotional as well as physical. She develops the concept of a web to show how the different elements of abuse connect and are interrelated, and sheds new light both on the dynamics of abuse which afford abusers control over women, and the resources and knowledge women draw upon to re-empower themselves. This book gives mental health professionals who are not child abuse specialists knowledge and skills that are especially relevant to their direct service role and practice context. It focuses on direct practice issues, including how to ask clients about child abuse, the nature of power in the

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helping relationship, the full recovery process, effective treatment models, client safety issues, and ways to listen to clients' stories. Also included are valuable insights into helping clients that are in a crisis situation, the particular needs of male victims of child abuse, racial and cultural considerations, and the professional's self-care.

This true-life book discloses acts of extreme mental, emotional, and physical and sexual childhood abuse. I present this story as a case study, thoroughly detailing extreme child abuse as I experienced it, and survived it. "*Little Boy Broken*" reminds us in the most graphic fashion that not all child abuse victims are little girls.

### **Living with My Family**

*Wendy Deaton, M.A. & Kendall Johnson, Ph.D., 1991*

This workbook serves as a tool for working with children who have been traumatized by a violent family fight. The book is intended for use in clinical settings by therapists, counselors, and school psychologists.

### **Living with the Enemy**

*Donna Ferrato with Ann Jones, 1991*

Ferrato, has attempted to show many different aspects of the problem of domestic violence through both photographs and text. She spent ten years going to various demonstrations and conferences, courtrooms, hospital emergency rooms, support and therapy groups, and even riding with the police on "10-4" calls to collect information as well as insight into this widespread problem. She interviewed battered women, violent men, and activists, and most recently interviewed and photographed women who are in prison for killing their husbands or lovers.

### **Locked in a Violent Embrace: Understanding & Intervening in Domestic Violence**

*Zvi Eisikovits & Eli Buchbinder, 2000*

This book undertakes the difficult task of analyzing and describing the experience of dyadic life in violence. It focuses on couples who chose to remain together in spite of the violence, attempting to make sense of a life in the shadow of pain, terror, guilt, and humiliation.

### **Lord Hears Your Cries: Hope and Strength from the Scriptures in the Midst of Domestic Violence, The**

*American Bible Society, 1995*

Using both Old and New Testament Scriptures, this booklet is designed to help the reader cope with difficult and complex emotions that come with an abusive relationship – shock, anger, fear, depression...It encourages one to seek comfort and hope in the Scriptures, and to find strength in prayer.

### **Lost Boys: Why Our Sons Turn Violent and How We Can Save Them**

*James Garbarino, Ph.d.*

Part two is a guide to relevant criminal and civil legislation, while part three details practical issues for interventions with children and their caregivers, and domestic violence perpetrators.

In her 23 years of mental health practice, she noted the silence surrounding upscale violence. She recalls a client who went to domestic violence court in a fur coat, standing among lower income sister-complainants. Roget's represents a significant change from a traditional thesaurus, which groups words by association rather than meaning. Roget's is a thesaurus-a "treasury"-of synonyms. Every entry is given a definition that is accurate for each word listed as a synonym for that entry. Many words have more than one definition, and separate lists of synonyms are five for each sense.

### **Roller Coaster of My Life, The**

*Liza Prael, 2004*

This is the life story of a women and her son that have survived abuse and want to share their story with the hopes of helping other people survive.

### **Roots to Power: A Manual for Grassroots Organizing**

*Lees Staples, 2004*

This how-to-manual presents strategies, tactics, methods, and techniques that community members can use to set their own goals, select issues, campaign for these issues, recruit member, develop leaders, hold effective meeting, conduct research, lobby politicians and legislators, and get the work out to the media.

### **Rural Woman Battering and the Justice System: Ethnography**

*Neil Websdale, 1998*

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In this book, *Websdale* presents a thorough look at the experiences of battered women in rural communities. He demonstrates, through ethnographic research, how the patriarchy and sexism within one rural web of law enforcement officers and local politics sustains and continues to reproduce the subordinate, vulnerable, and isolated position of many rural women. He recommends a coordinated community approach to rural battering that is spearheaded by state feminist agencies.

### **Sacred Hoop: Recovering the Feminine in American Indian Traditions, The**

*Paula Gunn Allen, 1986*

Written by a literary critic and Laguna Pueblo/Sioux Indian, this collection of Gunn's essays examines Native American culture, religion, and literature by putting women at the center of the tribal universe.

### **Safety for Stalking Victims**

*Lyn Bates, 2001*

Using scenarios based on real stalking cases, this book contains a variety of detailed, practical strategies for the victims. The authors description empowers victims to break free from the cycle of terror. Topics include: who stalks, who is stalked, and why; evaluating the seriousness of the situation; replacing terror with sensible precautions; maintaining your privacy. The books offers valuable information for victims service providers, as stalking victims often face misconceptions and misinformation about the seriousness of their situation that may place them in further danger.

### **Safety Planning with Battered Women: Complex Lives, Difficult Choices**

*Jill Davies, with Eleanor Lyon & Diane Monti-Catania, 1998*

This book introduces a new model of "woman-defined" advocacy that is designed to bridge the gap between a battered woman's perspective and a victim advocate's perception. The authors strive to help advocates better understand battered woman's decisions, including the decision to remain in an abusive relationship; to improve advocacy for victims with varying cultural backgrounds and experiences; and to provide advocates with assistance in redesigning their services so that they may better meet the needs of battered women.

### **Same-Sex Domestic Violence: Strategies for Change**

*Beth Leventhal & Sandra E. Lundy, Editors, 1999*

This book examines a broad range of issues that confront same sex victims of domestic violence and those who offer them services. It covers such topics as HIV and DV; establishing safe places for battered gay men; courtroom advocacy; and, coalition building.

### **Saving Bernice: Battered Women, Welfare, and Poverty**

*Jody Raphael, 2000*

This book tells the story of Bernice Hampton, a woman who became a victim of domestic violence at the age of fourteen, and applied for welfare at age eighteen. Her story illustrates how abuse and welfare trap battered women. Whenever Bernice tried to go to training or get a job, her partner physically punished her. To go to work, she would have to leave the relationship, but she did not see a way to do so without risking her life. As most of the welfare money went to pay the monthly

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rent, she was also trapped by poverty: her lack of funds further hampered her ability to devise a workable safety plan. Bernice's experiences illustrate the radically different kinds of assistance that need to be implemented in welfare-to-work policies. By examining her story on domestic violence and welfare, this book draws on a single life to explain and explore the actions and motivations of many poor women on welfare.

### **Scared to Leave, Afraid to Stay: Paths from Family Violence to Safety**

*Barry Goldstein, 2002*

This book presents the stories of ten women who fought the courts and their abusers to gain safety for themselves and their children. The author offers practical advice to women facing the difficulties of domestic violence and helps them find the resources necessary to escape safely. Also discussed are the common tactics used by abusers to maintain control over their partners, and demonstrates how courts handle divorce, custody and visitation, and child support.

### **Secondary Traumatic Stress: Self-Care Issues for Clinicians, Researchers, & Educators**

*B. Hudnall Stamm, Ph.D., 1999*

Beginning with the assumption that caring for people who have experienced highly stressful events puts the caregiver at risk for developing similar stress-related symptoms, this book brings together some of the best thinkers in the trauma field to write about the prevention and treatment of Secondary Traumatic Stress. This guide will examine a wide range of ideas about what is known, what is suspected, and what is wondered about, while exploring our ethical obligations to each other, to our communities, and to future trauma research.

### **Secret Survivors: Uncovering Incest and its Aftereffects in Women**

*E. Sue Blume, 1989*

According to the author, incest is the greatest underlying reason why women seek therapy or other treatment, yet most incest survivors do not remember that the abuse took place at all. This book expands the definition of incest to include any adult abuser, and focuses on what incest does to survivors. Also discussed is the connection between incest and such problems as depression, sexual and eating disorders, and drug and alcohol abuse.

### **Sexual Exploitation: Rape, Child Sexual Abuse, and Workplace Harassment**

*Diana E.H. Russell, 1987*

This book examines the common causes of three types of sexual exploitation: rape, child sexual abuse, and sexual harassment in the workplace. Russell explores in depth the causation of rape and child sexual abuse and shows how all three are interrelated.

### **Sexualized Violence**

*Guilford Press, 2004*

The first book to interweave clinical and legal perspectives on such recently formulated diagnoses as rape trauma syndrome and battered woman syndrome, this up-to-date resource helps mental health clinicians better understand their role in criminal or civil proceedings related to sexualized violence against women and children. Foundational knowledge is provided on the nature, prevalence, and psychological consequences of a variety of crimes, including rape, spousal abuse, stalking, sexual harassment, and child sexual abuse. The ways victims and perpetrators

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are dealt with in the legal system are critically examined, and important recent reforms discussed. Presenting guidelines and findings that will improve forensic assessment; this is a vital sourcebook for those called on to serve as expert witnesses and an invaluable student text.

### **Sharing Our Stories of Survival Native Women Surviving Violence**

*Edited by Sarah Deer, Bonnie Clairmont, Carrie A. Martell and Maureen L. White Eagle-2007*

In the United States, Native women are more likely than women from any other group to suffer violence, from rape and battery to more subtle forms of abuse. The stories and case studies presented here are often painful and raw, and the statistics are overwhelming grim, but a countervailing theme also runs through this informative volume.

### **Shelters for Battered Women & their Children: A Comprehensive Guide to Planning and Operating Safe and Caring Residential Programs**

*Albert L. Shostack, 2001*

This book compiles the author's research through an exploration of current statistics on shelter operations, current assistance opportunities for battered women, and current realities of shelter life. Topics discussed include: what works and what doesn't when setting up a new facility; potential internal and outreach services; staffing and volunteer issues for 24-hour operation; budgeting issues and funding sources; admissions, processing, and counseling of residents; and preparation of residents for new lives on their own.

### **Shot in the Heart**

*Mikal Gilmore, 1994*

This book tells the story of an American family tied up with domestic violence. It is the history of Gary Gilmore, a convicted murderer who was executed by firing squad in Utah in 1977. Gary's brother, Mikal, is the author who tells the tale of how the children of this family committed murder and murdered themselves in payment for a long line of ruin - it exposes and explores a dark vein of American life that most of us would rather ignore.

### **Something Happened and I'm Scared To Tell**

*Patricia Kehoe, Ph.D., 1987*

This book is written for the very young child (age three to seven) who is a suspected victim of sexual or physical abuse. The story focuses on rebuilding the very fragile self-image of the young child, and helps shift the blame from the victim to the perpetrator.

### **Something Is Wrong At My House**

*Diane Davis, 1984*

This is the English-language version of the book, *Algo Anda En Mi Casa*. Based on a true story about a boy living in a violent household, the purpose of this book is to help break the generational cycle of violence. *Something is Wrong at My House* will help all children by giving them permission to have feelings, acknowledge those feelings, and make decisions about how they wish to act on them. This book was designed for use with both preschool and school-age children.

### **Sourcebook on Violence Against Women**

*Claire M. Renzetti, Jeffrey L. Edleson, and Raquel Kennedy Bergen, 2001*

This book is a comprehensive information source on violence against women. It is an unsurpassed resource for students, practitioners, and academics, covering theoretical and methodological issues in research, types of violence, prevention, and direct intervention, and continuing and emerging issues in both domestic and international public policy.

### **So what's it to Me?**

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*Gayle M. Stringer and Deanna Rants-Rodriguez, 1987*

This book is intended for guys and offers information about sexual assault and violence. It talks about the images portrayed by the media and stereotypical gender roles verses reality.

### **Spin Works!**

*Robert Bray*

Spin Works! Is for people with news to make. It's for community activists, public interest organizations or any individual who believes in enhancing public discourse, fostering debate through the media and strengthening democracy.

### **Spouse Abuse: Assessing and Treating Battered Women, Batterers, and their Children**

*Harway and Hanson, 2004*

Harway (Antioch U., Santa Barbara; Fielding Graduate Institute) and Hansen's (psychology, Pennsylvania State U.) text provides hands-on training for clinicians at a variety of levels about how to assess and intervene with individuals and families experiencing spouse abuse. The second edition reports the latest information since publication of the first edition 11 years ago about the prevalence and seriousness of the problem, and provides additional guidelines on how to conduct an assessment and work with batterers, and greatly expanded information on assessing and treating children.

### **St. Louis County Sheriff's Office, Domestic Violence and Training Guide for Patrol Deputies**

*Ellen Pence, 2001*

This book was written for deputies in the St. Louis County Sheriff's Office as a guide to the implementation of new domestic violence policies.

### **Stalking the Stalker**

*Diane Glass, 2006*

More than one million people are stalked every year in the United States. Spyware, computer software, and online databases give stalkers easy access to your online accounts, daily habits, and personal communications. Despite this terrifying reality, there is good news: the technology that stalkers exploit can be used against them. *Stalking the Stalker* provides you with the high-tech know-how and low-tech advice you need to protect your privacy, your home and yourself.

### **Stir It Up Lessons in Community Organizing and Advocacy**

*Rinku Sen, 2003*

Sponsored by the Ms. Foundation for Women, *Stir It Up* draws on lesson learned from Sen's groundbreaking work with women's groups organizing for economic justice. Throughout the book, Sen walks readers throughout the steps of building and mobilizing a constituency and implementing key strategies that can effect social change. The book is filled with illustrative case studies that highlight best organizing practices in action and each chapter contains tools that can help groups tailor Sen's model for their own organizational needs.

### **Stop Domestic Violence: An Action Plan for Saving Lives**

*Lou Brown (father of Nicole Brown Simpson), Francois DuBau and Merritt McKeon, J.D., 1997*

This book offers hope and practical strategies for combating domestic violence. The first half is geared toward the support network of a victim - families and friends - and the second half is directed at the victims of abuse. This book will serve as an action plan for battered women and

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those around them by offering steps on how to combat battering within families, within communities, within homes, and at the legislative level.

### **Stopping Domestic Violence: How a Community Can Prevent Spousal Abuse**

*Pamela J. Jenkins & Barbara Parmer Davidson, 2001*

This book examines models of collaboration between personnel in social service agencies, domestic violence programs, women's centers, medical and mental health settings, and law enforcement. The authors emphasize how the possibilities for communities to respond to domestic violence are based on how these various groups perceive the victim, and how an individual agency personally responds.

### **Stop the Stalker: A Guide for Targets**

*Proctor, 2003*

One out of every 12 women and one out of every 45 men in the United States are stalked at some point in their lifetime! If you are a victim of a stalker or you suspect that you might be, this book will give you the means not only to protect yourself, but ultimately to help put the stalker behind bars. ### **Street and Runaway Teens**

*Editor-Cynthia A. Bily-2008*

Social issues are often viewed in abstract terms. Pressing challenges such as poverty, homelessness, and addiction are viewed as problems to be defined and solved. Behind every policy debate over poverty, homelessness, and substance abuse, for example, are real people struggling to make ends meet, to survive life on the streets, and to overcome addiction to drugs

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and alcohol. Their stories are ubiquitous and compelling. They are the story of everyday people—perhaps your own family members or friends.

### **Suddenly Single Mom: A Practical Guide to Self-Sufficient Survival**

*T.J. Terry, 2002*

Battered women often feel overwhelmed with all of the intricacies of living on their own after leaving an abusive partner. This book attempts to make these transitions easier, and includes sections on: situation solving techniques, assessing your assets, budgeting methods, utility use and cost reduction, and gainful employment.

### **Surviving A Stalker: Everything You Need To Know To Keep Yourself Safe**

*Linden Gross, 1994*

The ultimate practical guidebook to surviving stalking provides all the necessary tools you need to handle obsessive attention and to regain control of your life. “Gross”, explains how these dangerous obsessions begin, the patterns they take, and what potential victims can do before the nightmare becomes a reality.

### **Surviving Domestic Violence, Gender, Poverty and Agency**

*Paula Wilcox, 2006*

*Surviving Domestic Violence* follows a group of women on their journeys through and away from abusive relationships. Using a gendered lens, seven influential social dimensions are examined: power, emotion, children, home, economic resource, informal and community support. The book concludes that an overall strategy to decrease domestic violence needs to focus on economic independence for women, enhancing responses towards them and their children not only formal agencies but also from informal support networks and wider community.

### **Surviving Domestic Violence: Voices of Women Who Broke Free**

*Elaine Weiss, Ed.D, 2000*

This book tells the stories of twelve women. Each was a victim of domestic violence, and each escaped from her abuser. Each reclaimed her dignity, reconstructed her life, and rediscovered peace. Every woman who has left an abusive man – or has yet to leave – will find encouragement and hope in the voices of these women who broke free.

### **Surviving Sexual Assault**

*Los Angeles Commission on Assaults Against Women, 1983*

This book gives tips on the prevention of sexual assault, and information for the family and friends of an assault survivor. It provides answers to such questions as: Do I have to report this to the police? Will I ever feel safe again? Who can help me? Included is a nationwide directory of rape crisis centers and hotlines. ***Please be advised that the resource information and services may not be currently up-to-date, as the directory was published in 1983.***

### **Taking Back Our Lives, A Call to Action For the Feminist Movement**

*Ann Russo, 2001*

In this book, Russo challenges feminists to address lesbian battering, the social implications of lesbian pornography, as well as racism and white privilege in feminist theories and politics.

### **Talking It Out: A Guide to Groups for Abused Women**

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*Ginny NiCarthy, Karen Merriam & Sandra Coffman, 1984*

Written from a feminist perspective, this book examines how to begin a community group, and includes information about group leadership issues, as well as discussion topics and exercises. It also includes aspects of working with women of color, disabled women, recovering alcoholics, teens, religious and lesbian women.

### **Talking to Children/ Talking to Parents About Sexual Assault**

*Lois Loontjens, 1984*

This book gives example outlines on how to talk to children in a group or classroom setting about sexual assault.

### **Teens Guide to Personal Safety and Preventing Sexual Assault**

*KIDSRIGHTS, 2005*

Teen's Guide to Personal Safety and Preventing Sexual Abuse, Second Edition, is a revision of our well-respected Teen to Teen: Personal Safety and Sexual Abuse Prevention. Key Features: Uses the results of surveys of three groups of teens to present rules for personal safety rather than just the authority of the author, Offers worksheets for recording personal and family safety rules, Includes a quick test to measure of self-esteem, Shares a teen's personal experiences in dealing with sexual abuse within her family and its impact on her life, Presents information on personal safety issues that young teens face in two advice-column formats, one addresses to a teen female and the other to a teen male, Provides information on how to get help safely, including a list of the Web sites and phone numbers of national organizations on the inside cover.

This bilingual workbooks is created for children, ages 6-11, who have witnessed domestic violence. It is designed to guide a child and an advocate through activities and conversation. Please note that though it is a fill in workbook, the NNADV copy is strictly for review only.

### **A Terrible Thing Happened**

*Margaret M. Holmes, 2000*

This book presents a story for children who have witnessed any kind of violent or traumatic episode, including physical abuse, school or gang violence, accident, homicide, suicide, and natural disasters such as flood or fire. An afterword for parents and other caregivers offers extensive suggestions for helping traumatized children, and includes a list of other helpful resources.

### **There's a Rainbow in My Glass of Lemonade**

*Candace Hennekens, 1998*

This is a booklet that presents inspirational and affirming messages to victims of domestic violence to guide them in the transition from victim to survivor. (*Companion piece to Healing Your Life: Recovery from Domestic Abuse – also available from the Network.*)

### **Thin Book of Appreciative Inquiry, The**

*Sue Anne Hammond, 1998*

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Appreciative Inquiry suggests that we look for what works in an organization. The tangible results of the inquiry process are a series of statements that describe where the organization wants to be, based on the high moments of where they have been. Because the statements are grounded in real experience and history, people know how to repeat their success.

### **Tips For Women's Retirement**

*AIG Valic, 2002*

This book offers tips for women planning their retirement. It gives statistics about men's retirement verses women's and offers ideas about how women can get ahead.

### **To Be an Anchor in the Storm: A Guide for Friends and Families of Abused Women**

*Susan Brewster, M.S.S.W., 1997*

This book is the first hands-on guide for people who want to assist a friend or loved one in her struggle to escape domestic violence. The author weaves together lessons from her own life and many case histories, including the complete story of a woman called Jackie, as she supports her sister's attempts to leave an abusive husband. Brewster will teach how to recognize the signs of abuse, how to handle one's own negative feelings, how to become an effective advocate, how to deal with the batterer, and more. This book will give you the understanding you need to give strength to women who are trying to break free.

### **To Have & To Hit: Cultural Perspectives on Wife Beating**

*Dorothy Ayers Counts, Judith K. Brown, & Jacquelyn C. Campbell, 1999*

This book presents a collection of essays that address wife beating in 15 different cultures. Beyond informing, this collection also stimulates the reader to think about and study issues perhaps ignored in earlier cross-cultural and single-culture studies of family violence.

### **Top Secret: Sexual Assault Information for Teenagers Only (and Discussion Guide)**

*Billie Jo Flerchinger and Jennifer J. Fay, 1985*

This is a student and instructor/teacher discussion guide for a course discussing sexual assault. It offers questions and answers about sexual assault with specific situational examples.

### **To Tell the Truth**

*Brian Ogawa, 1997*

Written to help children through the court process, this book gives legal definitions and explains the legal process in simple language for a child to understand.

### **Transforming Pain into Power**

*Doris Helge, Ph.D., 1998*

This is a guide for achieving your personal empowerment and your freedom, including a section on emotional power: what is it, how to get it, and how to use it.

### **Trauma in the Lives of Children: Crisis and Stress Management Techniques for Counselors, Teachers, and Other Professionals**

*Kendall Johnson, Ph.D., 1998*

Parental separation, violence or abuse in the home, the death of a loved one – all of these, if not properly handled, can affect a child's development, health, school performance, family interactions, and self-esteem. This book uses up-to-date research to explain how children react to

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specific types of trauma, and shows what families and other professionals can do to help traumatized children regain a sense of security.

### **Trauma Recovery and Empowerment: A Clinician's Guide for Working with Women in Groups**

*Maxine Harris, Ph.D., 1998*

A workbook/manual for group leaders, this book combines elements of social skills training, psycho-educational and psychodynamic techniques, and the peer support groups shown to be most effective with victims. Each section includes discussion questions, typical responses, and experiential exercises.

### **Truth and Prejudice- Men's Experience of Domestic Violence**

This book is based on a review of research findings from around the world. The book unveils the truth head-on, and lays bare the prejudice male victims are subjected to by those responsible for responding to domestic violence victims.

### **Trust After Trauma: A Guide to Relationships for Survivors and Those Who Love Them**

*Aphrodite Matsakis, Ph.D., 1997*

With a sharp eye towards Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, the author writes this book for survivors and therapists to better understand the role of trust in victimization and healing.

### **Trying to Get Some Dignity: Stories of Triumph over Childhood Abuse**

*Ginger Rhodes & Richard Rhodes, 1996*

Written as a follow-up to Richard Rhodes's eloquent account of his own abuse as a child: *A Hole in the World: An American Boyhood*, this novel is an oral account of suffering and survival. Each of the twenty men and women interviewed by the authors speaks of horrific experiences – but each also testifies to the resilience of the human spirit that finds the will and the way to endure, to hope, and to overcome. Disturbing but ultimately uplifting, this is an intensely personal book and a powerful group portrait.

### **Understanding Violence Against Women**

*National Research Council, 1996*

This book attempts to highlight the major literature on the scope of violence against women in the United States, the causes and consequences of that violence, and the interventions for both women victims of violence and male perpetrators.

*Patricia Evans, 1993*

Recommendations and suggestions for healing and recovery are also presented.

### **The Verbally Abusive Man, Can He Change?**

*Evans, 2006*

In this groundbreaking follow-up to her bestselling books *The Verbally Abusive Relationship* and *Controlling People*, Patricia Evans goes beyond identifying verbally abusive behaviors to prescribing a course of action for both victim and abuser. It is also an excellent resource for researchers, practitioners, victims' right advocates, and those who deal with victims in the field of law, social work, counseling, and criminal justice.

### **Violence Against Native Women is Not Traditional**

*Karen Artchoker & Marlin Mousseau, 2003*

This handbook is designed to provide advocates with working knowledge about domestic violence in Native Nations, and includes information on tribal laws, options, and resources for Native American battered women.

### **Violence Against Women Act of 1994: An Analysis of Intent and Perception, The**

*Nancy Meyer-Emerick, 2001*

The Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (VAWA) is the most expansive legislation addressing intimate partner violence to date. In this book, the author examines VAWA using three specific research theories, as well as interviews with policymakers, professionals, and citizens.

### **Violence Against Women: The Bloody Footprints**

*Pauline B. Bart & Eileen Geil Moran, 1993*

Originally published as a special issue of *Gender & Society*, the editors have collected essays from various perspectives on violence against women, to explore this culture of violence and oppression, examining its structural supports in the social, political, and legal systems that protect the violent by blaming the victim. *Carol J. Adams & Marie M. Fortune, 1995*

With this anthology, the authors assert the need for a comprehensive examination of sexual and domestic violence within Christian theological education. This book shall better prepare those who minister directly with victims and perpetrators of domestic violence, and explores such topics as: scriptural interpretation, providing support for victims and survivors, and holding batterers accountable.

### **Violence and Nonviolence, Pathways to Understanding**

*Gregg Barak, 2003*

This book examines virtually all forms of violence, from verbal abuse to genocide, and treats all of these expressions of violence as interpersonal, institutional, and structural occurrences. In the context of recovery and nonviolence, Barak addresses peace and conflict studies, legal rights, social justice, and various nonviolent movements.

### **Violence in Dating Relationships: Emerging Social Issues**

*Maureen A. Pirog-Good & Jan E. Stets, 1989*

These fourteen significant chapters on physical and sexual abuse in dating relationships provide a comprehensive review of the subject. The contributors to this anthology examine every aspect of the serious, but usually hidden, social problem of dating violence and the consequences of different types of abusive behavior.

### **Violence in Families: Assessing Prevention and Treatment Programs**

*Rosemary Chalk & Patricia A. King, 1998*

This book discusses issues that underlie all types of family violence, such as the tension between family support and the protection of children, risk factors that contribute to violence in families, and the balance between punitive sanctions and individual support. It explores the scope and complexity of family violence, and outlines new strategies for collaborations between professionals.

### **Violence in Gay and Lesbian Domestic Partnerships**

*Clarie M. Renzetti & Charles H. Miley, 1996*

This book addresses the growing recognition of domestic violence in gay and lesbian relationships while discussing the social service needs of victims and perpetrators.

### **Violence in the Black Family**

*Robert L. Hampton, 1996*

This book is intended to raise a number of questions concerning the external environments and internal operations for black families victimized by the violence process. The author discusses how the responsibility of violence in black families resides as much in the society as in the relationships among family members.

### **Violence the Enduring Problem**

*Alex Alvarez & Ronet Bachman, 2008*

The authors explore a number of different types of both individual and collective violent acts and examine the linkages, behaviors, ideas, perceptions and justifications that connect these different types of violence. (*intended audience: This is an ideal core text for undergraduate and graduate courses such as Violence and Abuse.*)

### **Violent Betrayal: Partner Abuse in Lesbian Relationships**

*Claire M. Renzetti, 1992*

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The author addresses central issues in lesbian battering – the consequences for victims, batterers, and the community as a whole. Her research also examines the phenomenon of women using violence against their intimate partners, while making clear distinctions between battering and self-defense.

### **Violent No More: Helping Men End Domestic Abuse**

*Michael Paymar, 1993*

Using insight and narratives from his experience as a Batterer's Group facilitator for the Duluth Abuse Intervention Project in Minnesota, the author writes this book to batterers wanting to change. He helps men to understand the roots of their violence, take responsibility for their actions, and build relationships based on mutual respect. He includes stories of previously violent men and of women who were abused.

### **Violent Partners: A Breakthrough Plan for Ending the Cycle of Abuse**

*Linda G. Mills, J.D., Ph.D., 2008*

Although crime statistics and the media have led us to believe that men are almost always the perpetrators of intimate abuse, and women the victims, *Violent Partners*, uncovers a far more complex story in which both partners often participate in a dynamic of abuse. The author does not excuse violence, nor does she encourage those who are experiencing abuse to stay with the partner who are hurting them. Many of the couples who share their stories and family histories in *Violent Partners* do not want to end their relationships—instead, they are looking for resources that will help them stop the abuse. As an alternative, Mills develops a response that engages and treats everyone caught up in the violent dynamic.

### **A Volcano in My Tummy: Helping Children to Handle Anger**

*Eliane Whitehouse & Warwick Pudney, 1996*

Primarily created for children ages six to thirteen, *A Volcano in My Tummy* offers engaging, well-organized activities to create an awareness of anger and provide skills for anger management.

### **Walk By Faith, A**

*Dr. Gina L. Myers, 2007*

Dr. Myers was asked to write a book about her past because she has been called a "survivor" of parental alcohol abuse and domestic violence by many friends. This book is spiritually based and dedicated to the thousands of women who are living in violent situations who don't believe that they can have a way out.

### **Walking On Eggshells: Practical Counseling for Women In or Leaving a Violent Relationship**

*Dr. Brian Ogawa, 1996*

This book describes the feelings experienced by many women who are in relationships where physical and psychological abuses are present. It summarizes the nature of such relationships and presents specific ways a woman can respond to the violence realistically and responsibly.

### **Walking Together: Working with Women from Diverse Religious and Spiritual Traditions**

*Jean Anton, Editor*

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*Walking Together* is an outstanding tool for advocates—informative, supportive and helpful. This is a much-needed resource to enable domestic violence programs to work sensitively and effectively with women from a variety of religious and racial/ethnic backgrounds.

### **War Against Women, The**

*Marilyn French, 1992*

Written by a best-selling author and feminist scholar, this book dedicates itself to an analysis of history and culture, urging a public conversation of a culture that she argues represses women physically, economically, culturally, and politically.

### **Webster's New World Compact Desk Dictionary and Style Guide**

*Editor: Michael Agnes, 2002*

An indispensable reference for office or Home. Clear, concise definitions help you say exactly what you mean. With 61,000, entries. 3,000 of them new, this dictionary covers the practical language you need every day.

### **A Week in the Life of Tristan**

*Susan Venters and Diane Ponder*

This is a story about a young child and parent who leaves home and moves into a shelter. It talks about the difficulties of having to leave familiar surroundings, meeting new people, and the emotions that children can experience.

### **What's a Nice Guy: Perfect Relationship, Secret Abuse**

*Pines, 2007*

Why is it that women who are being abused stay in the relationship—beyond verbal abuse, into violence, and even to the point of death? Their reasons for staying include these questions: Where will I go? What will I do? What will happen to my family? What will he do? Yet, underneath those questions is the real piece that ties her to him: Emotions. She loves him. She needs him. What a Nice Guy describes the emotional connection that binds a woman to her abuser, the escalating violence in the relationship, the cycle of abuse, and the moment that a woman realizes she is being abused. The moving narrative is divided into sections that end with questions for thought and for journaling.

### **What Are You Feeling? / Que Sientes Ahora**

*Casa de Esperanza, 2007*

These bilingual flash cards will assist children in identifying and describing twenty-four different emotions such as bored, brave, disappointed, excited, guilty, etc.

### **What Do You Stand For? A Kid's Guide to Building Character**

*Barbara A. Lewis, 1998*

Even elementary school children can build positive character traits like caring, citizenship, cooperation, courage, fairness, honesty, respect, and responsibility. This book serves as a helpful guide for kids as they decide what they stand for—and what they won't stand for. The true stories,

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inspiring quotations, thought-provoking dilemmas, and activities in this book will help kids grow into capable, moral teens and adults.

### **What Every Woman Should Know About Divorce and Custody**

*Gayle Resenwald Smith & Sally Abrahms, 1998*

A complete insider's guide filled with crucial advice from judges, lawyers, therapists, and mothers who have gone through the challenging legal process. It is designed for women at every stage of divorce and covers a wide range of legal strategies, as well as financial and psychological issues.

### **What's Happening In Court?**

*Judicial Council of California, 1999*

This guidebook is intended for children who are in court for any reason—whether they are witnesses, visitors to the courthouse, or involved in a case. It aims to introduce children to the California court process and the people who work there.

### **What Jamie Saw**

*Carolyn Coman, 1995*

Having fled to a family friend's hillside trailer after his mother's boyfriend tried to throw his baby sister against a wall, nine-year-old Jamie finds himself living an existence full of uncertainty and fear.

### **What Now? A Guide for Parents of Sexually Abused Children**

*Victims In Crisis, Turmoil, or Recovery INC, J.C. Penny Co. INC*

This booklet was written to help you get through a very trying time. Because of the emotional turmoil, you are most likely experience right now; don't be surprised if you are unable to read this from start to finish.

### **What Parents Need to Know About Dating Violence**

*Levy Giggins, 2005*

What every parent needs to know about Dating violence and their teenage children.

### **What to Do When Love Turns Violent**

*Marian Betancourt, 1997*

An authoritative resource for victims, this book is dedicated to help women with safety planning, leaving, and using available support services, (police, courts, financial concerns, medical attention, and domestic violence programs) as well as how to stay safe, keep their kids safe, and regain control in their lives.

### **What's My Job in Court?**

*Baltimore County State Attorney's Office, 1993*

This is an activity book for children who are going to court. It is intended to familiarize children in an educational and appealing way with the concepts, people, vocabulary, and events that are a part of the court process.

### **When Bad Things Happen to Good People**

*Harold S. Kushner-1983*

Clergyman Kushner addresses the universal question of why a just God would allow terrible tragedies to befall essentially good people. Discussing his family's struggle with his own son's

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terminal illness, Kushner explores the ways that faith in a compassionate God can sustain one during times of crisis.

### **When Battered Women Kill**

*Angela Browne, 1987*

The author, a social psychologist, draws upon interviews of 250 physically battered women – including 42 who made the drastic shift from victim to murderer – to explore the realities, developing patterns, and tragic consequences of domestic violence. Significantly, she critiques a criminal justice system which frequently punishes victims of family violence.

### **When Dad Hurts Mom: Helping Your Children Heal the Wounds of Witnessing Abuse**

*Lundy Bancroft, 2005*

Can my partner abuse me and still be a good parent? Should I stay with my partner for my children's sake? How should I talk to my children about the abuse and help them heal? Am I a bad mother? Mothers in physically or emotionally abusive relationships ask themselves these questions every day. Here, a counselor reveals how abusers interact with and manipulate children-and how mothers can help their children recover from the trauma of witnessing abuse. This book, the first ever of its kind, shows mothers how to: Protect children and help them heal emotionally, Provide love, support, and positive role models, even in the midst of abuse, Increase their chances of winning custody, Help their kids feel good about themselves.

### **When Katie Wakes**

*Connie May Fowler, 2001*

This is Fowler's personal account of the abusive relationship she endured as a young woman, and how, with the loving help of her Labrador puppy Kate and, she finally made the decision to end the years of mistreatment and transform her life.

### **When Love Goes Wrong: What to Do When You Can't Do Anything Right**

*Ann Jones & Susan Schechter, 1992*

The authors combine 15 years of experience in working with and researching survivors of domestic change their lives.

### **When Men Batter Women, New Insight into Ending Abusive Relationships**

*Neil Jacobson, Ph.D. and John Gottman, Ph.D.-1998*

This book offers a significant breakthrough in our understanding of the men who become batterers and how to put a stop to the cycle of relationship violence. It also offers advice and support to women in abusive relationships, as well as to friends, relatives, and caregivers who want to help.

### **When Mommy Got Hurt**

*Ilene Lee & Kathy Sylvester, 1996*

The stories and pictures in this book give preschool children four messages: violence is wrong, the violence is not their fault, violence happens in other families too, and it is okay to talk about it. (This book can be used in conjunction with *Into the Light: A Guide for Battered Women*)

### **When Violence Begins at Home**

*K.J. Wilson, Ed.D, 1997*

This conclusive guide addresses the needs of multiple audiences, including battered women from various backgrounds, teenage victims of dating violence, educators, and community leaders. Special chapters clarify the responsibilities and limitations of friends and family, shelter employees, health care providers, law enforcement officers, employers, and clergy when

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responding to domestic violence. Also included is a comprehensive listing of national resources. ***Please be advised that the resource information and services may not be currently up-to-date, as the directory was published in 1997.***

### **When Violence is No Stranger**

*Leslie, 2002*

Focusing on the psycho spiritual effects of this sexualized violence, Kristen Leslie offers the psychological and theological tools to religious professionals for understanding the deep spiritual trauma of the survivor and how best to work with her to reconstruct a personal world of meaning, trust, and faith. Based on extensive interviews with survivors, Leslie explains the personal and theological issues they raise, what they found helpful from religious professionals, the images and metaphors most germane to their trauma and recovery, and how they coped with or healed from the experience of rape.

### **When Your Child Has Been Molested: A Parents Guide to Healing and Recovery**

*Kathryn B. Hagans & Joyce Case, 1988*

One of the first books written to address the needs of parents in protecting their children and helping them heal. The authors offer information, comfort, and advice to families in making it through the trauma of molestation, and step-by-step guidance from suspicion through legal procedures.

### **Where Women Stand: An International Report on the Status of Women in 140 Countries (1997-1998)**

*Naomi Neft & Ann D. Levine, 1997*

Find out information on a multitude of important issues, and discover facts pertinent to anyone concerned about women's issues and women's status in the growing global community. Based largely on United Nations documents and unpublished reports commissioned by the U.N., this book provides the latest facts on women in the world around us.

### **Whom Shall I Fear: A Spiritual Journey of a Battered Woman?**

*Lavon Morris-Grant, 2001*

This book presents the story of the Morris-Grant's own experiences with domestic violence. Her husband was emotionally and verbally abusive, but never physically abusive - until she left him. He then came after her, shot her four times, and then killed himself. This is the empowering account of how the author and her children re-built their lives with help from their family and from God.

### **Why Do They Kill**

*David Adams, 2007*

"David Adams's interview with 31 men who killed intimate female partners breaks new ground in the study of domestic violence and homicide. This is the first American study of domestic homicide that includes in-depth interviews with killers.

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### **Why Does He Do That? Inside the Minds of Angry and Controlling Men**

*Lundy Bancroft, 2002*

This ground-breaking book reveals: the nine different types of abusers and how to assess each type; the tactics and techniques abusive men use to confuse and control their partners; the reason so many men get away with abuse and how and why friends, family and even some mental health professionals ignore, condone and encourage their behavior; the effects of abuse on children even when the abuse is not directed toward them; how to determine whether a relationship can improve or whether it is time to go; and, how to leave it safely.

The woman whose spirit is being crushed and whose life is endangered by domestic violence needs straight answers-not unrealistic expectations or clichéd, stereotypical platitudes. In this book; she will get straight answers, clear scriptural direction.

### **Woman-to-Woman Sexual Violence, Does She Call it Rape?**

*Lori B. Girshick, 2002*

This book offers much needed insights on the subject of woman-to-woman sexual violence which is rarely discussed in the literature on domestic violence. It recommends how agencies can best provide services, outreach, and treatment to survivors of woman-to-woman rape and battering, using suggestions by the survivors themselves.

### **Women and Male Violence: The Visions and Struggles of the Battered Women’s Movement**

*Susan Schechter, 1982*

This book is a comprehensive and historic analysis of the roots of the domestic violence movement, as well as its growth. In the process, Schechter examines the struggle for public, judicial, and social service reforms, the role of academic sociologists and professionals, racism, state and national coalitions, government, the role of lesbians in the movement, and men in a violent culture.

### **Women, Anger and Depression: Strategies for Self-Empowerment**

*Lois P. Frankel, Ph.D., 1992*

Though not written specifically to survivors of domestic violence, the author challenges readers to explore how finding anger can help to deal with depression and overcome the feelings of denial that serve as obstacles to personal empowerment.

### **Women Escaping Violence: Empowerment through Narrative**

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*Elaine J. Lawless, 2001*

This book offers the unique view of battered women's stories told in their own words, as well as a feminist analysis of how these women use the power of narrative to transform their sense of self, and regain a place within society.

### **Women Imagine Change: A Global Anthology of Women's Resistance**

*Eugenia Delamotte, Natania Meeker & Jean O'Barr, 1997*

This is a collection of women's writings from all over the world, across a span of twenty-six hundred years, which speaks to the ways women have resisted oppression and the methods they have found to gain power over their lives. This book will attempt to answer such questions as: How have women in the past confronted justice? How have women in different cultures changed their lives? And, what are the best strategies for effecting change?

### **Women Who Run With the Wolves: Myths and Stories of the Wild Woman Archetype**

With exercises to help you decide what you want in a relationship, it provides steps for leaving an abusive partner and making new friends.
