Abuse Assessment Response Course: Systems Approach to Partner Violence Across the Life Span *Physicians for A Violence-Free Society, 2003*

This is a CD-Rom Program designed for physicians to learn how to recognize and respond to domestic violence. Included are discussions on: dynamics, screening and assessment, and documentation; as well as resources for those who want to teach this course, including scripted PowerPoint presentations, instructor notes and role-playing exercises.

Adolescent Reproductive Health Education Project 2nd Edition (DVD)

Physicians for Reproductive Choice & Health

Physicians for Reproductive Choice & Health, the voice of pro-choice physicians, exists to ensure that all people have the knowledge, access to quality services and freedom to make their own reproductive health decisions.

Agents of Change: The Law Enforcement Response to Family Violence

Victim Services Agency, 1987

27 Minutes

Directed towards law enforcement personnel this video covers issues around domestic violence and police intervention. It addresses arrest and mandatory arrest laws in domestic violence cases, and explores creative ways to handle perpetrators, while sending the message that abusers need to be held accountable for their actions. It also offers suggestions about various programs to help battered women and their children.

Anxiety Related Disorders: The Worried Well

17 minutes

This video provides a guide to improving communication among the various services agencies upon which domestic violence victims and survivors rely.

Ask Now, Ask Always: Domestic Violence Education

Erie, PA

25 minutes

This video provides educational pointers to people who may be dealing with domestic violence. It stresses the importance of asking potential victims to determine whether, or not they are in a violent situation.

Automated Victim Notification Services (VINE: Victim Information and Notification Everyday)

Washoe County Sheriff's Office, 1999

This is a set of three videotapes explaining the VINE Program, which is a free, anonymous, 24-hour telephone service that allows a victim to check on the custody status of inmates in the Washoe County Jail and to register for automatic notification when an inmate is released, transferred, or escapes. The videotapes begin with a program overview, move on to officer's training, and finally, explain how to use the VINE service.

Breaking (the) Barriers: Reaching South Asian Abused Women

Kinetic Video

60 minutes

Designed to increase awareness of service providers to the cultural issues affecting their ability to counsel and assist South Asian battered women. Divided into 4 units; Cultural Barriers; Overcoming Cultural Barriers; The Counseling Process. This video also has a corresponding facilitator's guide.

Breaking the Rule of Thumb

Women Make Movies, 1997

35 minutes

This documentary takes viewers on a journey through time, discussing the issues that battered women face even today, twenty years after the domestic violence movement. This video discusses the legal aspect in which domestic violence has been a part of; including changing the definitions of violence.

Breaking the Silence: Children's Stories

Connecticut Public Broadcasting, 2005

56 minutes

This follow-up to the 2002 documentary describes the issues raised for children growing up in violent homes. Interview with kids and their parents provide first-hand testimony.

Breaking the Silence: Journeys of Hope

Connecticut Public Broadcasting, Inc. & Tatge/Lasseur Productions, Inc., 2002

60 minutes

Originally aired on PBS during the first part of 2002, this documentary demonstrates how many women are now surviving the terror of domestic violence, and finding hope and new lives through local community resources.

Broken Vows: Religious Perspectives on Domestic Violence (Parts I & II)

Center for the Prevention of Sexual & Domestic Violence, 1994

Part I: 37 Minutes Part II: 22 Minutes

This video is a two-part program intended for clergy, congregations, religious educators, and staff of battered women's programs and human service agencies. Three aspects are focused upon: (1) understanding the dynamics of domestic violence; (2) supporting individuals experiencing domestic violence through the cooperation of religious and secular communities; and (3) developing programs for the prevention of domestic violence. Part I addresses the various aspects of the problems and situations of battered women, while part II discusses possible clergy and congregation responses to these problems. Throughout both parts, the viewpoints of formerly battered women, clergy, psychologists, and shelter workers are expressed.

CAAW: Community Affair

Committee to Aid Abused Women

This video was produced by the Committee to Aid Abused Women to increase awareness in the community about the effects of domestic violence. It covers the client services that CAAW provides, and interviews formerly battered women in the area. The producers also talk to local judges, prosecutors, and law enforcement to enlighten the viewer about what they are doing to help prevent and eliminate domestic violence.

California Domestic Violence Ads: PSA

Family Violence Prevention Fund, 1999

This video consists of 14 different Public Service Announcements sponsored by various domestic violence organizations throughout California. Included are two Spanish and two Asian version announcements, along with some animated examples of how domestic violence affects children.

Charting New Waters: Responding to Violence Against Women With Disabilities

Terra Nova Films Inc., 1996

35 minutes

This video is designed to raise awareness of the barriers and issues faced by women with disabilities when they try to end the violence in their lives. The video combines interviews with disability advocates and criminal justice personnel with three dramatic vignettes. It also includes a facilitators 'guide.

Chase, (the): Victims' Rights (PSA)

U.S. Department of Justice, Office for Victims of Crime

30 seconds

Children and Domestic Violence

Altschul Group Corporation, 1994

16 minutes

This video examines how to recognize children suffering from the devastating effects of domestic violence. Various mothers are shown learning to understand and cope with domestic violence and the affect it has on their children. Various forms of abuse are covered, and the warning signs of troubled behavior from the child of an abusive home are reviewed.

Children of the Lie

Pennsylvania Coalition Against Domestic Violence

12 minutes

Narrated by Martin Sheen; this film deals with the effects of domestic violence on children, and grown children from violent families are interviewed and share their stories of survival. The safety factors involved when women decide to leave is discussed. The film also offers suggestions and resources that women and children can access.

Child Witnessing of Domestic Violence: Who is Being Neglectful?

This is a cassette tape.

Circle of Accountability

Texas Council on Family Violence

17 minutes

This video deals with the law enforcement and criminal justice response to family violence. The video also features men who were abusive to women, and who have changed their ways with the help of intervention programs.

City of Shelter: A Coordinated Community Response

Global Village Communications, 2000

Eight (8) hours total running time

This documentary-based training series examines barriers to, and successful strategies for developing an integrated approach to reducing domestic violence. It was created to help members of a domestic violence task force to understand what every other member's limitations, frustrations, and strong points are - to help each member see how other members of that task force can help them do their job better. Therefore, it is strongly recommended that this series be viewed as an entire course, rather than in individual sections, as each segment draws from information presented in a previous segment. Specific segments include:

Part 1: Starfish and Part 2: House of Horrors

102 minutes

Part 1 examines how attitudes and changes in laws have affected the way we approach the problems of domestic violence. It presents a historical context for intervention, and the philosophy behind the concept of a, "coordinated community response."

Part 2 examines some experiences of victims, batterers, police officers, prosecutors, judges, victim advocates, and batterers' treatment specialists to offer insights into the reasons victims stay in abusive relationships, the terror victims live with, and the barriers they encounter when trying to leave. Additional topics discussed include: battering as a chosen behavior, lethality indicators, and the effects of domestic violence on future generations.

Part 3: Herding Cats and Part 4A: The Health Care Response

79 minutes

Part 3 gets inside coordinating councils to look at the clashing, and ultimately, the collaborating of diverse professionals.

Part 4A defines the common characteristic of successful coordinating councils: each person's understanding of everyone else's procedures in response to domestic violence. This segment begins that cross-understanding by looking at the health care response.

Part 4B: Walk a Mile in My Moccasins: The Law Enforcement Response and Part 4C: The Shelter/Advocate Response

117 minutes

Part 4B looks at changing laws, changing procedures, and changing attitudes among law enforcement officers. Dual arrests, primary aggressor, and evidence gathering are some of the areas covered by chiefs, detectives, and patrol officers.

Part 4C looks at the struggles of running a shelter, dealing with the court system, collaborating with police officers, and, above all, keeping victims safe.

Part 4D: The Prosecutors' Response, Part 4E: The Judicial Response, and Part 4F: The Batterers' Intervention Response

120 minutes

Part 4D discusses how prosecutors play a vital role in holding batterers accountable for their actions, but must weigh their decisions against victim's safety and autonomy. Prosecutors share their strategies and philosophies about a crime that is often difficult to prosecute.

Part 4E judges talk about recanting victims, batterer manipulation, no-drop policies, court watch programs, and collaboration.

Part 4F explores the views of batterers, batterers' intervention specialists, and judges in this examination of the effectiveness of batterers' intervention programs. This is not a "how to" of batterers' intervention programs.

Part 5: Coordinating Councils Mature and Part 6: City of Shelter

53 minutes

Part 5 looks at domestic violence coordinating councils after the "chill" has thawed and the members move forward, despite conflict and the on-going need for training.

Part 6 asks the question "what does it take for a community to be a City of Shelter?" Police officers, judges, advocates, and other community members remind us that the ultimate goal of a coordinated community response is to save lives.

A Contract for Change: Mobilizing the African Community to end Domestic Violence

University of Minnesota-2007

This DVD highlights the 2007 Annual Conference entitled-Mobilizing to End Domestic Violence. The conference drew over 600 attendees from all regions of the country, which represented individuals from diverse professions and interest, including domestic violence advocates, social workers, victims, law enforcement officers, judges, clergy and faith healers.

Crime Against the Future

March of Dimes, 1989

22 minutes

This video examines the #1 health problem in America: battering during pregnancy. Most battering begins while a woman is pregnant, and approximately one in twelve women are battered during pregnancy. Battering causes low birth weight and miscarriages, while the woman's anxiety can also cause development problems to the fetus. This video informs the viewer of various methods used in hospitals and emergency rooms to assess if a woman is being battered; and serves as an outreach tool to protect the unborn child and provide counseling to pregnant women.

Crime of Human Trafficking, (the): A Law Enforcement Guide to Identification and Investigation

Criminal Justice Response to Domestic Violence in Later Life

Intermedia, Inc., 2001

25 minutes

This video examines the fact that elder abuse will continue to be a growing problem as the North American population of "baby-boomers" begins its transition into later life. Featuring law enforcement professionals from around North America, this video addresses the training needs of police officers and victim advocates responding to domestic violence in later life, and teaches interviewing skills and evidence collection specific to elderly victims.

Cut It Out

Salons Against Domestic Abuse

National Cosmetology Association/Claire Professional/Southern Living

This video (and its accompanying manual) presents an educational seminar for cosmetologists and other salon professionals. Topics include warning signs of abuse, and what to do if you think a client is in danger.

Danger Assessment and Safety Planning

Emerge

71 minutes

This DVD was created as a resource for police, prosecutor, probation officers, victim advocates, and batterer intervention workers in doing domestic violence danger assessment with a victim and perpetrator. The interviews are actual police officers, a community-based victim advocate, a prosecutor, and a prosecutor-based victim advocate.

Dating Violence: The Hidden Secret

Intermedia, Inc., 1993

25 minutes

This video incorporates interviews with experts on adolescence and violence in dating relationships, interviews with teenagers who have been involved in abusive relationships, and the commentary of two young hosts to examine the problems of physical, emotional, and sexual violence in teen relationships. It challenges the myths regarding male and female roles, and offers solutions and skills to deal with teen dating violence.

Dating Violence: "Love's Not Supposed to Hurt"

30 minutes

This video presents a live audience of college students engaging in a spontaneous interactive discussion about the issues of dating violence.

Defending Our Lives

Cambridge Documentary Films
30 minutes

This video aims to educate people about domestic violence and to spur legislative and judicial reform. It is appropriate for people working on any aspect of this issue, including general education, legal reform, police training, battered woman advocacy, counseling, prosecution and defense, human rights activism and community education.

Disability, Identity & Culture

Advocating Change Together, 1999
22 minutes

Featuring performer, Cheryl Marie Wade, this video looks at what it means to live with a disability in America today. It uncovers issues such as freedom of choice, independent living, sexuality, community, and the right to live with dignity. It argues that there is a distinct disability culture, and at the core of this culture are empowerment, pride, and a non-apologetic celebration of differences.

Disability, Violence and Survival: A Personal Story

Safe Place, 2000
11 minutes

A powerful account of domestic violence and sexual assault narrated by a survivor describing her own experience, including the barriers she encountered while seeking justice.

Domestic Violence Awareness: Action for Social Change.

Domestic Violence Awareness Project, 2005.

This project was put together to raise awareness about the power of domestic violence advocates. The project covers different cultures and backgrounds, and discusses social change, gender, and language analyses of violence against women.

Domestic Violence Danger Assessment and Safety Planning

An interactive Training DVD-67 minutes

This DVD was created by Emerge and JG Productions as a resource for police, prosecutors, probation officers, victim advocates, and batterer intervention workers in doing domestic violence danger assessment and safety planning with victims. Five scenes are included in this dvd showing law enforcement professional and a victim advocate conducting a danger assessment with a victim and perpetrator. The interviews are actual police officers, a community-based victim advocate, a prosecutor, and prosecutor-based victim. This includes how to establish rapport with victims how to recognize and respond sensitively to victim trauma.

Domestic Violence and Family Preservation

Perman Planning Teleconference, 1994

A videoconference discussing, family violence, and what we can do to preserve the family. It presents a large panel made up of social service providers from all over the country, that answer questions from participants, while moderated by Bonnie Krasik. Presented in two parts, this video contains an overview of basic domestic violence issues, and how they relate to family preservation services, and the effects of battering on children, and how the collaboration of different social service agencies is essential for family preservation.

Domestic Violence Screening for Health Care Professionals

New Hampshire Coalition Against Domestic & Sexual Violence, 2002

The purpose of this video on routine confidential screening for domestic violence in the health care setting is to demonstrate effective methods of screening and interventions for health care providers. It will also serve to identify ways in which a patient may present the fact that they are a victim, and successful ways of intervening.

Domestic Violence: The Law Enforcement Response

Law Enforcement Resource Center, 1999

Four (4) hours and twenty (20) minutes total running time

This is a multimedia learning program including four videos, an instructor's manual, and a student guide. The curriculum is designed for officers and deputies who respond to domestic assault calls, and focuses on the techniques for law enforcement of investigating these types of cases. Each training module is focused on how an officer accomplishes a certain aspect of the investigation, i.e. establishing probable cause; determining if self-defense was a factor; interviewing victims, suspects, and children; enforcing protection orders; writing investigative and arrest reports; applying federal jurisdiction laws to a case; and, deciding whether or not to make an arrest.

Domestic Violence Training Promo

Office of Minority Health & the U.S. Dept. of Health and Human Services, 2000

15 minutes

This is a promotional video published by the Office of Minority Health to educate people on what steps to take when dealing with a domestic violence situation.

Domestic Violence: The Workplace Responds

Office for Victims of Crime & the Family Violence Prevention Fund, 2001

15 minutes

Survivors of domestic violence, their co-workers, employers, and experts share real-life stories that powerfully demonstrate the impact of domestic violence on the workplace. This video will show employers and co-workers how they can assist employees who are in abusive relationships.

Elder Abuse: Five Case Studies

Terra Nova Films,

40 minutes

Each of the cases in this video is real-not reenacted-and has been tracked over a period of time. This video explores the issues of family abuse against an older adult very personally from the point of view from five different victims. Their candor in telling about their situation give the viewer insight into the ambivalent feeling of older abuse victims as they try to find a resolution to their pain. In the context of their struggle we also see the various interventions that can be used to help stop the abuse, including counseling, shelters, supportive services and legal action.

This resource guide is for faith community responses to Domestic Violence. The goal is to enhance victim safety and improve perpetrator accountability.

Expert & Witness Testimony in Domestic Violence Cases: Beyond the Battered Woman's Syndrome

Legal Action of Wisconsin, Inc.

This set of 5 videotapes presents a training done in Wisconsin to facilitate the use of witness and expert testimony in domestic violence cases. The training emphasized that "Battered Woman's Syndrome" is inadequate to characterize either the reactions or behaviors of battered women, and that a more accurate representation of battering and its effects includes a much broader range of issues.

Facing Diversity: Responding to Violence Against Women from Diverse Cultures

This video helps to raise awareness of the issues and barriers faced by women from diverse cultures as they deal with the domestic violence in their lives. It illustrates specific and culturally-sensitive practices for police, prosecutors, and victim advocates; and presents examples from Hispanic, East Asian, and South Asian cultures.

Anger has power but can do immense damage if handled poorly. This video will help to identify one's style of handling anger and teach specific techniques that will help one to *use* anger to build intimacy.

From the Ground Up: Strategies for Organizing in Rural Communities

This is training guide for rural grant recipients, designed to show them how to create a grass roots, non-profit domestic violence organization. The video is accompanied by a 37-page discussion guide.

This video presents a live audience of college students engaging in a spontaneous interactive discussion about the issues of dating violence.

Grassroots Fundraising Training Series

Kimberly Klein: Fundraising Consultant and Trainer, 1983

Three (3) hours total running time

This is a four-video training series for non-profit and grassroots organizations that are looking for new ways to raise funds. The series is divided into the following segments:

1) Asking for Money and Prospect Identification

51 minutes

This segment covers topics such as: definition of a major gift, prospect identification, how to approach a prospect, tips on asking, and exercises and handouts on practice solicitations.

2) Major Gift Solicitation

39 minutes

This segment discusses the basics of conducting a major gifts campaign, including: what to look for in a prospect, and the "fine art of asking".

3) Raising Money by Mail

51 minutes

This segment covers the different aspects of raising money by mail, and includes some ideas on: asking current donors for extra gifts - why, how, and how often, and expanding your mailing list.

4.) The Role of the Board

40 minutes

This segment discusses how an organization can work at getting its board members all "on the same page" in terms of fundraising.

This video features five women from different ethnic and socioeconomic groups who have survived domestic violence. The program dispels myths about domestic violence and examines the effects on the community as a health issue.

This includes Flash Videos designed to help you recognize the signs of domestic violence and provide you with the information to respond to someone you know who may be a victim. It provides printable documents and resources to assist you and strengthen victims' safety.

Hot Head in the House

15 minutes

This video contains live footage of police officers on domestic violence calls. Battered women and batterers discuss how they are trying to work together to resolve the violence in their families, and the issue of batterer's responsibility is examined. Also presented is an overview of the Batterer's Intervention Program in Duluth, Minnesota.

Hummingbird: Documentary Domestic Violence (DVD)

Holly Mosher's Productions, 2007

Featured on PBS producer Holly Mosher's documentary highlights the work of the Women's Life Collective and the House of Passage in Brazil. Hummingbird shows how through nurturing vulnerable women teaching them about their human rights, love, and respect they can become productive members of their communities.

I Am Woman: Voices of Power: African-American Women

This video is targeted toward shelter workers and facilitators of support groups. It discusses how to use the power and control wheel as a tool to help battered women understand the dynamics of domestic violence; and explores the question "Why do men abuse?" This video also discusses our society, and how it is filled with male hierarchy and how we are conditioned to accept that men should be in charge.

The objective of this study was to understand the dynamics of urban youth culture, which allows, supports, and even encourages violence in male/female dating relationships. This video will provide a first-hand account of how young urban males and females see each other and define their relationships, while also addressing a number of underlying factors which contribute to dating violence.

Olga Trujillo, is a nationally recognized speaker and trainer, reminds viewers of the seemingly counter-intuitive ways survivors endures. The story is divided into four segments—witnessing, childhood, adolescence and healing.

Scenes From A Shelter: Talking About Domestic Violence

This video talks about domestic violence honestly and directly. It depicts life in a shelter through the eyes of children, reminding them that they are not alone, that they are not to blame, and that they can talk about how they feel no matter how confused or strange the feelings may seem. This video includes five clinical vignettes demonstrating techniques for screening and responding to domestic violence in primary care settings. This video is designed to familiarize lawyers, police officers, judges, and victim service providers with several new laws that can help victims of domestic violence. Symposium on Domestic Abuse: Sarah Buel

This video presents a keynote speech given by Sarah Buel, a Harvard Law graduate and survivor of domestic violence. A very powerful speaker, she takes the approach that all violent social problems are caused by domestic violence. She emphasizes that domestic violence is the #1 cause of injury to women, and discusses how the community needs to take responsibility for the problem. She also explores the reasons why women stay in violent relationships, and explains why it is a further victimization to even ask a battered woman that question.

Teens Speak Out: Dating Violence

This video introduces the topic of dating violence to today's youth. It presents actual teen testimonies and stories of young victims of abuse in order to educate teens on the warning signs of dating violence and to let them know that help is available.

To Save a Life: Ending Domestic Violence in Jewish Families

This video presents the points of view of formerly abused Jewish women, rabbis, and psychologists to offer guidance to Jewish women who are experiencing abuse in their marriages, and also to religious leaders, shelter staff, and other helpers who work with victims of domestic violence. This program directly addresses religious issues that may be preventing women from seeking help, offers women hope, and assures them they will not be alone as they undertake the difficult task of confronting abuse.

Toxic Relationships

This video touches on teenage relationships and how they are the building ground for adult relationships. This film examines the scope of domestic violence in America and the effects, both physically and emotionally, that result from violence in the relationship. Interviews with 3 battered women, one who left a violent relationship, one who killed her abuser, and one who was being abused while pregnant, are used to answer common questions and to discredit societal myths about battered women. Available services for battered women and perpetrators are discussed.

Unbalanced Scales: Gender and the Justice System

Kinetic Video 1999

20 minutes

Judges, defense lawyers and prosecutors, police, parole officers, teachers and students of law enforcement, social agencies that help women are the intended audiences of this video. The problem it deals with is the re-victimization of women at the hands of the justice and social systems after these women have already been the victims of the crime of domestic violence. The video is a consciousness-raising tool about this systematic discrimination and gender bias. It helps viewers identify specific policies, procedures, and practices which may appear neutral and fair but which, in actuality, have an adverse impact on women. Finally, it generates suggestions on ways to address this problem. This video has a corresponding video guide listed in the manuals.

Un Nuevo Amanecer: A New Dawn

Texas Council on Family Violence & the Texas Department of Human Services' Family Violence Program, 1996

This film features a domestic violence depiction conceived entirely in Spanish that portrays the life of a Latina who is battered and the progression of domestic violence in her everyday life. This educational video is ideal for public education and outreach efforts, as a training tool, and for use in support groups.

Unlearning Violence: Safety Nets for City Children (Parts I & II)

Intermedia, Inc.

20 minutes

This video presents lessons that are simple and engaging for children. Part I is geared toward children in grades kindergarten through fourth grade. It is composed of two short vignettes acted out by young children, and a brief montage of children giving their opinions on the subject of violence. Part II is geared toward children in grades five through eight, and focuses on the idea that violence is a learned behavior and that, because of this violent conditioning, they are at risk of making choices that can seriously jeopardize their well-being.

Violence in Dating/It's Not Always Happy in My House/In Need of Special Attention

Violence in Northern Nevada: There's No Excuse: PSA

60 minutes

This public service announcement addresses the issues surrounding domestic violence in Northern Nevada. The video includes: facts about domestic violence, how violence is perpetuated, the lethality of domestic violence, child abuse and its effects on children, and some facts about hate crimes in Northern Nevada.

Violencia Doméstica y Abuso Substancial

23 minutes

This is a video presented entirely in Spanish discusses the link between domestic violence and substance abuse. It provides examples on how to break the cycle of violence, and includes discussions around topics such as: emotional and sexual abuse, co-dependency, and violence as a learned behavior. Also included are resources and tips for family and friends.

Violencia Doméstica y Las Mujeres

Altschul Group Corporation, 1994

16 minutes

This video, presented in Spanish, profiles a woman named Olivia as she struggles to keep her and her children safe in an abusive home environment. Topics presented for discussion include: the characteristics of an abuser, and some basic legal actions a battered woman can take (i.e. protective and no contact orders).

Violencia Doméstica y Los Niños

Altschul Group Corporation, 1994

16 minutes

This video, presented entirely in Spanish, examines how to recognize children suffering from the devastating effects of domestic violence. Various mothers are shown learning to understand and cope with domestic violence and the affect it has on their children. Various forms of abuse are covered, and the warning signs of troubled behavior from the child of an abusive home are reviewed.

Violencia Familiar: Una Perspectiva Masculina

Intermedia, Inc., 2000

This video is presented in Spanish with English subtitles. It tells the stories of four men who overcame their need to abuse and control their partners. They discuss the effects their violence had on their children, the harmful legacy of violence that was handed down from father to son, and the effect a "macho" culture had on them. Also, experts in family violence offer their perspectives on the harm of abuse, and discuss ways for batterers to change.

Two teenage couples represent the differences between a healthy and a violent relationship in this video. It depicts one of the males as controlling, jealous, and both physically and emotionally abusive toward his girlfriend. As the violence continues to escalate, the other teenage couple reaches out to their friends and offers suggestions.

Who Do You Tell?

MTI Film & Video
11 minutes

This animated children's video discusses a variety of difficult problems that face children today, and teaches how they can use various support systems to overcome these problems. Topics covered include domestic violence in the family, child molestation, what to do if there is a fire or if you get lost, how to contact the police, alcoholism in the family, and much more.

Wings Like a Dove: Healing for the Abused Christian Woman

You Can't Beat a Woman

Films for the Humanities & Sciences, 1998

91 minutes

Moving from Canada to Russia, South Africa, Israel, Japan and Chile, this documentary examines the phenomenon of violence against women through the eyes of nine former victims. As the women tell their stories, we are drawn into the composite sights and sounds of the societies they inhabit and examine the role those societies play in the perpetuation of the problem. In studying the issue, we meet not only the women plus, a range of professionals including politicians, lawyers, clerics and psychologists. The failure of institutions and agencies set up to protect women is examined within the context of legal constraints.

You Oughtta Know: Teens Talk about Dating & Abuse

Films for the Humanities & Sciences, 1999

24 minutes

In this video, diverse groups of teenagers speak out about abusive dating relationships with the help of a youth relationship facilitator. Topics discussed include how to identify abusive dating relationships; what causes them; why, once in them, couples try to make them work; and, what can be done about them.

You're Hurting Me, Too: Children and Domestic Violence

Intermedia, Inc., 1996

This video examines both the long and short-term effects of violence on children. Experts reveal that children who witness violence may be more at risk to commit suicide, engage in delinquent behavior as adults, and grow up to become victims or abusers themselves. It also stresses the importance of providing counseling for children, and discusses the difficulties children face in the legal system.

Youth Dating Violence
